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June Contest Report

The Pack Rat annual trek to a mountain top for the June VHF contest has been going on for over thirty years. This years operation from Camelback Mountain is about the fifth or sixth year (They all run together after a while) that the Pack has been operating from this Pocono Mountain location. The effort by the membership was outstanding! For the first time in recent memory we had plenty of help to set up and tear down. We were still a little light on operators, but still had enough to keep the stations on the air.

This year saw many improvements in equipment. New antennas for six meters proved to operate very well. Stacked five element beams that were optimized for front to back allowed more comfortable operating with the reduction in QRM afforded by the high rejection off the back. Two meters again installed the "Death Ray' and had new 2m FM antennas to help out on the contact total. 220 had new antennas for the low end and FM. 432 used four FO 22s in a H-Frame with a mast mounted preamp to pull out the weak ones. 440 FM used four vertically stacked 6 element beams. The microwave gang improved all the stations and have even bigger plans for next year. Large bandpass and notch filters help relieve the interference from friendly transmitters. The food was excellent. The power was flawless. The telephones worked most of the time. The rain was refreshing. The lightning was far off. The bears stayed home. No planes crashed. Our cup runneth over.

There were too many people who really put out big efforts to thank each one individually. You who put out a special effort know who you are and I thank each and every one.

SILENT KEY - JOE KILGORE, W2EIF, 1908-1996

This brief memorial cannot do justice to Joe for all that he was to his family, his work, his activities, and his hobbies. It's not easy to describe Joe. So many adjectives apply. I've heard Pack Rats - - - a Giant; a Rock; etc. I will try to highlight some of his life.

Joe was born in Harmony, Pa. His early education was in Kentucky. From there, he attended Columbia University for his EE degree. Obviously, he found his niche in the field of electronics. It was his work and a hobby. About 1938, he worked for RCA, interrupted by a stint with TWA in Kansas City, then back to RCA and the war years and much history. Joe worked on Army and Navy equipment that many of us G.I.'s used. I can see Joe's influence mechanically and electronically on units that I used. I never thought I would meet the person who helped develop these huge devices. Joe was with RCA until his retirement.

Joe was a family man. He had five lovely children - three girls and two boys. A pleasure to meet, well spoken and so like Joe. I first met Joe when he lived in Camden. He later moved to Straford, NJ where he started a farm of antennas - as well as tomatoes. Other hobbies included photography and bowling. He was an avid sports fan. Joe enjoyed young people. During his early years, he coached a sandlot football team. He was a teacher. You could see this in the kindly way he helped young hams get started.

Joe joined the Pack Rats shortly after the club was formed. His interest in VHF and the fraternalism of the club was innovative. He built antennas. He seemed to specialize in 220. Joe loved contesting and never missed them. His many years of net control work on 2 meters has to be a record. Joe designed the Pack Rat logo. A great ragchewer, he always had time for a chat and his humor left you laughing.

We will miss Joe, he'll be a legend with us. But we'll remember him also as a super ham, creative, kindly, a loving family man and a dear friend of us all.



It is the time of the year for the annual Packrat White Elephant Auction. This means it is time to move that extraneous piece of equipment out of the shack and bring it the July meeting where another Packrat can have a chance savor it for a while! No really, in the past all who have attended have had a good time, found many bargains and enjoyed plenty of refreshments. A map is shown below. Parking is available across the front of my place and the adjacent property. If overflow occurs, the lot by the pharmacy can be used, six doors down, especially since it is no longer in business. It is also lit at night. See you on the 18th, 8:00 PM.



The 1996 Rover effort was hampered with an assortment of problems. Preparation's were slowed due to the authors insistence on getting two 24 GHz rigs on the air before the contest. As usual the rover station went up into the mountains with no prior on air checks. (This is not recommended.) Luckily all the equipment worked well.

W3HT and KB3XG arrived at the Rat site in FN21 at 2 P.M.. The first stop always takes longer than expected. It's hard to remember how to hook things up when you only use the equipment once a year. We walked up the bands without a hitch including 5X9 sigs on 24192.100 MHz. The signal was drifting around a bit (xtal multiplication factor = 241) and the CW sounded a little fuzzy (like aurora) but this was an exciting introduction to a new band. The microwave captains determined that since the contest had already gotten underway, it would not be a good lidea to stop and mount the 24 gig dish to the mast. WB3JYO and I promised each other that next year we would do a more thorough engineering job, as opposed to a last minute throw it together project.

In my haste, I forgot the all important liaison communications devices. I called my home QTH and had Celeste and N3AOG deliver the devices to Mount Pocono Airport, Dick experienced IFR weather conditions for the first time in many years. The aeronautical rover platform departed to Binghamton to pay for the rental car for the FN22 site (Binghamton airport closes at 6 P.M..) and Harry and I dropped one of the communications devices off at the W3CCX microwave shack.

Next Harry and I visited the site in FN10. This site is surrounded by high mountains and is actually a lousy site except for the straight shot through a valley back to the Rat mountain. The prime operating spot at this site is no longer accessible by car. I brought along a large gel cell and set up shop at the base of a high tension tower. We worked all bands from 903 through 10,368 MHz. I know this is not news, but it's amazing how the lack of obstacles can improve signal strength. We enjoyed 20 over 9 arm chair rag chewing with W3CCX for a short period on 10368 MHz. Harry was certain that 24 gigs would have worked from this site. It was 9 P.M. before we had the car packed and were on our way.

The original plan was to have the plane meet us at Hazelton airport, but we learned during a telephone QSO that Dick and Celeste had spent the early evening hours practicing thunderstorm avoidance. They made it into Binghamton on an instrument approach just before the onset of some severe thunderstorms. Dick told me that there was a lightning strike on the field moments after the main gear touched the narway. Harry and I met up with the two harrowed flyers in the bar at around 11 P.M..

I woke up Sunday morning feeling very ill. I'm not sure if it was due to the lack of sleep or the over abundance of beer the night before. I must have looked really bad because Dick offered Celeste two silver dollars to hold my eyelids closed in case I dropped dead at the next grid. Harry and Dick helped pack my rigs in the rental car and convinced me that I would soon feel better.

We arrived at White Birch Airport in FN22 around II am. I located this site last year during a unscheduled operating event with our old friend N3CX. The prime operating spot at this site is on the taxiway of what I thought was an abandoned grass strip. When we arrived we found the parking lot packed with cars and planes arriving and departing at regular intervals. After introducing ourselves as fellow pilots, we were immediately invited to drive our rental car onto the taxiway to set up the rover station. The airport was having a fly in breakfast. We had scrambled eggs, pancakes, sausage, bacon, toast, and coffee for \$2.25. What a deal! Too bad it's out in the middle of nowhere. We worked all bands through 10 GHz with 59 sigs. Once again, it's not a great site, but the Delaware River valley is right off the end of the runway which gives a clear shot to FN21.

By the time we returned the rental car and had the plane repacked it was 4:30 P.M. Better judgment told us to call it a day and return home. Instead we climbed in the plane and flew to Clearfield, PA. I thought for sure the airport would be closed and the rental car would be gone, but to my surprise the airport manager was still there. He had some sort of comment like "Are you always this late?" I admitted my guilt and asked for the keys to the rent a wreck. It was 7 P.M., the contest clock was ticking away, and I chose to visit the site in FN00 over the FN01 site since we made out so well there last year.

We arrived at WA3FFC's private mountain in FN00 at 8:30 P.M.. A light ground fog covered the mountain peaks to the west and an extremely strong wind was blowing in the next storm system from the north. We only worked the Rats up through 2304. Signals were very weak on that band. I spoke with WA3NUF using my communication device about the poor band conditions. He commented that there was light rain and some fog at the mountain. Last year there was an narrow isolated cell of precip between our two stations perhaps acting as a reflector? It was 10 P.M. before we finished up and we were too tired to return to FN20 Sunday night, Fortunately, Clearfield, PA is not a vacation hot spot and hotel rooms were readily available. I have tried to make it to more than 4 grids each year, but my plan always fails. Everything must work perfectly to make it to the fifth grid. Maybe being 100% prepared before the contest is the key to success? There's always next year.


WB3JYO "ROOTS" 'Behold, the only nine contesters greater than thyself on the bands::




Map to Pack Rat Picnic on August 17




Map to the W2EIF Work Party

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
The W3CCX Operation during the June 1996 VHF QSO PARTY




10 GHz and 5.7 GHz Microwave Dishes



903 MHz - Quad Yagis




Six Meters - 5 over 5 Element yagis





1296 MHz - Quad Loop Yagis

The W3CCX Operation during the 1996 VHF QSO PARTY








Al, N3ITT at the 2M FM Position


The W3CCX Operation during the June 1996 VHF QSO PARTY

Joe, AA3GN, at the 6 Meter Position





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



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
