There was a good turnout on all bands for the 5th running of the ARRL VHF/UHF Spring Sprints. HQ received a total of 433 logs for the 1987 events.

HINTS and BITS

Transverter and amplifier set-up

The following is generally for 10 watt 50-432 MHz transverters. Most transverters can be overdriven to up to 15 watts, but are linear to the 10-11 watt range. Higher power amplifiers made for 10 watts input will be overdriven if used with anything greater than 10-11 watts also.

The 28 MHz I-F drive level must be adjusted correctly for proper operation of any transverter. The following procedure is used for most transverters.

It is important that the HF radio be operated with the drive controls set at maximum. This will ensure that the transverter will not be overdriven should the drive controls of the HF rig be mis-adjusted. Proper RF attenuation is then placed between the transverter and the HF rig to provide 10-11 watts output.

- 1. Place a 10 watt power meter and dummy load on the output of the transverter. (A thruline meter is the usual Amateur power meter).
 - 2. Turn the drive controls of the HF rig down to minimum.
- 3. Apply 12-14 vdc to the transverter and key the unit into transmit. (hard keying of the transverter and amplifiers is suggested over RF switching).
- 4. Tune the preselector for maximum on 28 MHz on the HF rig (if one is available) and place the HF rig in the CW mode and depress the key (or put the rig in the tune mode).
- 5. Slowly adjust up the I-F drive until 10-11 watts of output is seen on the output meter.
- 6. If the drive control on the HF rig is not at maximum, then attenuation must be inserted between the two units.
- 7. OR- adjust the variable attenuator inside the transverter so that you have 10-11 watts output with the HF rig's drive control up all the way.
 - 8. OR- a combination of both 6 and 7.
- 9. The drive level is set properly now and the transverter will not be over driven into the non-linear region of output.
- 10. For SSB; turn up the Mic gain until the output meter reads about 1/3 of a 10 watt full scale while speaking into the Mic. (full scale voice peaks **mean distortion**)

If a 100 watt linear is spec'd at 10 watts input, then 10 watts is all that you should use. A few watts more output at the 100 watt level is never seen at the other end anyway. Also note that the amplifier's output power is spec'd while being measured on a real power meter into a good 50Ω load, with the rated input at the input connector. An amplifier may appear out of spec on a thru line meter. Enough said!
