NEW PRODUCTS OF INTEREST TO HAMS By Lyn, W3NSI

- 1. KENWOOD R-600 RECEIVER: The new R-600 is a general coverage communications receiver covering 150 Khz to 30 Mhz in 30 bands. It features a five digit frequency display, both 6 and 2.7 Khz filters for SSB and CW reception, and an RF attenucator. In most respects, it is a smaller version of the popular R1000. Price \$369.
- 2. Weatheradio by Radio Shack: The new three channel, crystal controlled #12-152, weatheradio receives the three NOAA frequencies 162.4 162.475 162.55 Mhz. Receiver operates on built in 9 volt battery and uses built in whip antenna. Tests indicate the unit will receive at ranges of 50 miles and more, probably due to the RF amp used in the circuit. No tuning is required. The on/off switch is a push bar on the top, the other controls are on the case bottom. Price \$25.
- 3. Lunar 220 Mhz Amp: The new 1.3M4-30P amplifier is designed to be used with a 1-4 watt HT unit. A built in receive preamp can be switched in to increase sensitivity. A regulated 9.6 or 10.8 voltage is available from the unit to operate the HT. The amp can be used on FM or SSB with a power gain of 10 times. Price \$125.

WHF/UHF REPORT By Joe, W2EIF

The DX has continued on 6 meters. The band has been open to South America and the Carribean. Feb. 2 found the ZL's getting into Texas. Feb. 3 produced contacts with Panama, Columbia and Equador. These openings apparently did not produce any X band contacts in the AM. The band seems to have closed down as of Feb. 18 at least in the E.Pa. S.NJ area. We can not expect this type of DX much longer since the Sun Spot activity is surely dropping. There have also been some very good auroras which have yielded contacts up thru 220 Mhz. I managed to work W9UD, W89SNR(III.), K9MRI (Ind.) and K8ATQ (Ohio) on aurora Feb. 4 on 220.

 2 meters seems to have dropped off in activity particularly on 144.200. Maybe it will pick up with the Spring weather. If you want activity <u>you</u> should get on the air. Don't wait for the other guy.

FROM NORTHEAST VHF NEWS

FCC Beacon Proposal: PR Docket 81-823 proposes authorizing beacon stations (one-way transmissions are normally prohibited by Amateurs) in the subbands: 28.08-28.10, 50.06-50.08; 144.05-144.06, 220.05-220.06, 222.05-222.06 and 432.07-432.08 Mhz, using AØ, A1, FØ, or F1 emission. All amateur frequencies above 450 MHz would also be permitted using any mode authorized for the particular frequency. Beacon power input would also be limited to 100 watts, and identification would be required at intervals of one minute of less. CW identification would be "WlXYZ/B" or "WlXYZ/BCN"; on phone the word "beacon" would have to follow the station callsign. Only one beacon would be permitted on each band from a given location, and though "automatic control" would be permitted, measures would be required to insure the beacon's proper operation when no control operator was on duty. Comments on PR81-823 will be due at the FCC March 15, with reply comments due April 15. (ER RPT).

MORE FROM THE OLD TIMER

Sometimes progress is good and sometimes it is just the opposite. Better living through chemistry sometimes ends in Love Canal. And sometimes watching "Sixty Minutes" on your boob tube can give you a simultaneous chest x-ray.

And, sometimes dividing up Amateur Radio frequency bands into a lot of little channels, hoping to reduce interference and improve the range of communication, can lead to trouble. Just because the cab drivers and airplane drivers and bus drivers have to talk on channels is no reason to do it on the Ham bands. We only started this foolishness because we bought their surplus gear cheap, modified it and used it. And now we have the habit.

Here's some of the things that can happen:

Large groups of Hams begin to use a favorite channel regularly and it's nice. Unitl, one day, in flies "Big Bird"----you know, the long-winded gas bag whose rapid maunderings soon drive away the rest. And, there is the obscene sickie who moves in from his rubber room to display his mastery of gutter gabble. Also, the malicious interference expert with his trigger-fast mike button and raucous touch-tone pad! Egad!!

What we need to do is de-channelize, de-repeaterize and use the whole band with one station and during one transmission!!

Now, before you think I'm off the deep end and rowing with one oar, have you ever heard of <u>spread spectrum</u> operation?? This is what I mean.

The simplest type of spread spectrum operation is called frequency hopping. Imagine your transmitter automatically hopping at high speed from one frequency to another in an apparently random manner all during the time you are talking. And imagine you have given the list of frequency hops to the person you will talk to and his receiver is automatically hopping in synchronism with your transmitter. He can hear and understand you perfectly, as you can him. BUT, no one else, not having the code of frequency hops, can hear, or understand you.

Well, here is the best part.

A large number of QSO's can be handled on the same frequency space at the same average time without interference, and only those stations who share a common hop code can significabtly interfere with each other. In fact, stations with one hop code will probably not even be aware of the presence of other stations.

So, see what I mean?...we should de-channel and spread out and leave the channels to those potential recipients of the Wouff Hong, appropriately applied!



QSL's are not required. The participation period will be the entire month of March. Send a 5x7 sase. The OSCAR 8 QSL card continues to be available for reports of telemetry. Send your requests to OSCAR 8 Fourth Anniversary, ARRL Club and Training Dept., 225 Main St., Newington, Ct. 06111 AR.

ARRL BULLETIN NR. 19 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS NEWINGTON CT FEB.11, 1982 TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT: FCC today adopted a combined Notice of Proposed Rulemaking and Notice of Inquiry on the subject of HF phone band expansion. The Commission proposes expansion of the 14 Mhz phone and by 50 kHz, from 14.150 to 14.350 MHz, with the new segment to be available equally to licensees of General class and higher. There would be no change to the segment 14.200 to 14.275 MHz, which would continue to be available only to Advanced and Extra class. In its Notice of Inquiry, FCC requests comments on several issues relating to phone subbands, among them the desirability of expanding other phone bands and the proper relationship between frequency and mode privileges and license class. Amateurs wishing to comment should wait until a Docket number has been assigned and the actual document has been released. Sufficient time will be provided for comments after the details are published. QST will carry details as soon as they are available. AR.




432 MHZ 100W AMPLIFIER by W3KKN






