

NEW PRODUCTS OF INTEREST TO HAMS By Lynn, W3NSI

- 1. SYNTHESIZED 440 FM RIG TR 8400: Kenwood has introduced a new 440 Mhz rig that covers range 440-450 Mhz in 25 Khz steps. Rpt operation with 5 Mhz offset is a standard feature, as is up and down scan, controlled by buttons on the mic. Scan can also be used in the automatic mode, in 25 Khz steps, stopping on any active channel. A four digit frequency display indicates channel in use. The S/RF meter is one of the new bar LED indicators. RF output is 1 W or 10 Watts switched from front panel.
- 2. NEW 220 HT: Talk is around concerning a new 220 HT from Digicom. The unit, DG220A, is crystal controlled on six channels, and has an output of 2 watts. This should be about the same size as the Tempo S2 220 Mhz unit, which is also synthesized, but sells for about twice as much. Price \$169?? Digicom, 5419 LaPalomas Ct., Las Vegas, NV 89120
- 3. HAM OPERATING CONSOLE: Keith Engineering Corp. is advertising their Keith Konsole, designed with the ham in mind. The cabinet is 72 inches high, 36 inches wide, and 20 inches deep. A choice of two plastic laminates is available Oak or Pecan. A sample of each will be sent with the order blank. Four front doors allow storage of power supplies in the bottom, while the upper doors open to allow access to equipment placed on the adjustable shelves. A working surface slides out on ball bearing tracks that allow 19 inches of travel. Appears to be well built. Price \$380 + ship., P.O. Box 16782, Clayton, MO. 63105

ARRL BULLETIN NR 136 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS NEWINGTON CT DEC. 18, 1980 TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT The FCC has decided to make permanent the rule requiring commercially made Amateur Radio amplifiers to be type accepted. The Commission has also decided to release a further notice of proposed rulemaking in Docket 21117 looking toward allowing manufacturers of amplifiers to supply to licensed amateurs instructions on how to modify the amplifiers already purchased to operate in the 28 MHz band. Details will appear in QST AR.

FROM HR REPORT DECEMBER 19, 1980

PLAIN LANGUAGE AMATEUR RULES, docket is due out in today's (Dec. 19's) Federal Register, where it's likely to occupy 25 to 30 pages of small print. The Notice of Proposed Rule Making. PR Docket 80-279, includes both the texts of the present Part 97 rules and the proposed rewrite plus explanations.

Significant Changes, such as the deletion of all logging requirements and addition of a requirement that licensees must keep a copy of the Amateur rules on hand (HRR 329), also include a warning that the FCC can inspect a station "at any time during the business day or any time your station is transmitting or has just finished transmitting." The new rules no longer tell an Amateur how he should make various measurements, but only how the FCC inspector would make them during a station visit. The proposed new rules also clarify rules on interconnects (phone patches), antenna heights, and emergency and prohibited communications. The also include much more information on exams, both written and code, and propose that applicants with FCC Commercial CW licenses get credit for the equivalent Amateur CW exam. The rewrite also endeavors to consolidate and reorganize the rules into a more concise and logical arrangement.

In addition To Being Printed in Dec. 19's Federal Register, PR Docket 80-729 will also be available in limited quantities from the FCC Office of Consumer Assistance, Room 258, 1919 M Street NW, Washington, D.C. 20554. Comments won't be due until June 19, 1981, and Reply Comments on August 19, 1981.





SOLID STATE RF SWITCHING by Dave Mascaro, WA3JUF

Most transceivers today use diode switching for antenna changeover instead of relays. The first schematic is a basic pin diode switch used for antenna changeover. The RFC and quarter wave coax lines determine the frequency used.



The second circuit is an RF switch used as a local oscillator power splitter. It feeds an RX mixer and a TX mixer. Oscillator frequency is 422.666 MHZ for a 1296 MHZ transverter.



FROM THE CIRCUIT BOARD By Jordan Kaplan, W9QKE

This month we will expand on our comments regardint he art of short wave listening. In addition to the big guns of the short wave frquencies with varied programming, the transmission of tones, and time pulses by the technical "Standard Time And Frequency" stations is of interest not only to the scientific community, but also to the casual SW listener, and of course the radio amateur. We are all familiar with the signals that are transmitted from Fort Collins, Colorado by WWV and WWVB, and from Hawaii by WWVH.

Some of us find that the signals from our friends to the North in Canada are easier to use during some times of the year; CHU transmits on 3330 Khz, 7385 Khz, and 14,670 Khz. Identification is voice in English and French.

The granddaddy of them all, The Royal Greenwich Observatory in England transmits from GBR on 16 Khz, and from GBZ on 19.6 Khz with time signals during the 5 minutes preceding 0300,0900, 1500, and 2100 UTC.

The Radio Research Laboratories in Tokyo, Japan operate station JJY on 2500 Khz, 5000 Khz, 10000 Khz, and 15000 Khz. I.D. is transmitted every 10 minutes in Morse and Voice with time in Japan Standard Time.

Our neighbor to the South, Mexico transmits on 4800 Khz on XDP, 6976 Khz on WBA, 13043 Khz on XDD, and 13953 Khz on XBA. Daily broadcasts are only available from 1754 hrs to 1800 hrs. That's right! Six minutes a day!

From Lyndhurst, Victoria, Australia, station VNG transmits time and frequency standards at 10 KW on 4500 Khz, 7500 Khz, & 12000 Khz. Voice ID is used.

Besides the famous Woodpecker signals from the USSR, signals are transmitted from 6 different cities and in both the LF and HF bands, to provide standard frequencies. Some of the HF frequencies are: 4996, 9996, 14996, 10004, 15004, 2500, 5000, 10000, and 15000 Khz. Most frequencies in the HF bands operate at specific times during the day. Only two transmitters that operate from Irkutsk appear 24 hours each day.

Some "non-standard" frequencies used to give time and/or frequency standards are: 8167.5 Khz in Argentina, 8721 Khz in Brazil, 4298, 8558 Khz in Chile, 3810, 7600 Khz in Ecuador, 1077.5, 1387.3 Khz in France, 12763.5, 16980.4 Khz in Germany. Hong Kong uses 13020.4, 17096, 22536, 13344, and 8903 Khz. Indonesian time signals show up on 8542, and 11440 Khz. Peru uses the 8650, and 12307 Khz pair. 12724, 17018, 22455 Khz are broadcast from Capetown South Africa. 12008, & 6840 Khz come out of San Fernando Spain.

Oh yes, before I forget! The U.S. Naval Communications Station, NPG in California transmits from Stockton on 3268, 6428.5, 9277.5, and 12966 Khz. The Navy also operates NPN on Guam, and NMO in Hawaii with time signals. Next time someone asks you what time it is, turn on your receiver and give them the time from another part of the world via the wonderful world of SW listening.
