

VATICAN RADIO AWARD By: Bill Welsh (W6DDB)

(LERC BULLETIN)

Vatican Radio is celebrating its 50th anniversary by issuing a special award to those who contact (or hear) at least 2 of the 3 active Vatican stations between 1 October 1981 and 1 February 1982. These stations are HVICN, HV2VO, and HV3SJ.

Vatican stations expect to operate code, radioteletype, and voice (AM,FM, and SSB).

So thru 2 meter bands will be used. Contacts can be cross-band, cross-mode, repeater/Oscar, mixed, or regular. Applicant must send photocopy of each QSL confirming 2-way contact(or SWL) before 31 Dec. 1983 to HVlCN, Vatican Radio, Vatican City, Europe. This announcement indicates the Vatican stations will be on the air, giving many amateurs a chance to work another country.

- L. HANDI-CON V-VHF CONVERTER: M-Squared Engineering Co. is now producing a small self contained VHF HI converges for use with synthesized HTs that cover the 2M band. The HC-V allows reception of signals in the 154-158 Mhz and 159-163 Mhz bands, covering both public service and marine frequencies. Standard BNC fittings are used with a male fitting provided for connection to the HI antenna terminal. Internal protection is provided in case the transmitter is switched on while the converter is in operation. In the off position, the HT can be used in the normal manner, without having to disconnect the HC-V. Price \$45. 1446 Lansing Ave., San Jose, CA 95118
- 2. SCANNER FILTER: Grove Enterprises, Inc. has an interesting scanner filter covering 80-180 Mhz. It is installed betweenthe antenna and the receiver. Signals that are interfering can then be tuned out with this notch circuit. This might come in handy when operating on 2 meters and receiving interference from paging or local police, fire or airport operations. Price \$40. Brasstown, N.C. 28902
- 3. VHF/UHF ACTIVE ANTENNA: Grove also has an active indoor antenna system, the Scamp ANT-4 which covers from 30-512 Mhz. The ANT-4 is rated at 18 Db signal over a 1/4 wave whip built into most scanners. When switched off the Scamp works like a normal 19" whip antenna. Operation is simplified by taking 12 VDC at 10 Ma from the receiver with which it will be used. Price \$50.

VHF/UHF REPORT By Joe, W2E1F

The bands 50 Mhz and up have been very quiet since the September QSO Party. The six meter band has shown that it is still open occasionally to the South Atlantic. W2AXU reports that he has heard the FY7THF beacon quite strong in the AM, these early October days and ha worked FY7AG. FY7THE is at 50,035 and TY7AC is about 50,105.

Two meters continues to show nightly activity particularly around 144.2, KiPXE and myself are still on the schedule Tuesday nites, 144.150 at 8 P.M., 1296 shortly thereafter, with liason at 144.150. Then we go to 220.1 with contacts from Conn. to VA.

WA3GOO reports that using a double cavity filter on the low end of 220 got rid of the crud from Channel 12. He is only 10 miles from Channel 12 towers. Maybe the use of filters would also help a lot of 220 people in Channel 13 area also!

W2AXU reports a visual as well as radio aurora, with signals on six and 2 on October 13 around midnite - no doubt the late hour accounted for the lew signals heard.

FROM RF CARRIER A CURE FOR FROZEN BEAMS

You have probably all heard the comment on the air, "Sorry but I can't turn my beam in your direction, it's frozen." If you plan on doing any work on your beam this fall consider the above addition. It's cheap, simple and guaranteed to prevent freeze up. To make, get a common funnel (6" size will do fine), cut off the end and slit the small end in four places. Bend tabs back so the resulting hole is approximately equal to the mast diameter. If your antenna is already up, you will have to cut one slit completely thru. Slide it down over the mast or open it up and snap it around the mast. Adjust so that the bearing area is up under the lip. Tape well with electrical tape or duct tape. If you had to completely cut it open, the cut edges must be taped. Duct tape is probably best for this. Presto you are done. The funnel prevents lubricants from being washed out, reduces rusting in the bearing area and most important keeps moisture out that can freeze.

Harry McConaghy, Former Engineer Helped Develop Navy Equipment: Harry A. McConaghy, 71, a retired civilian engineer with the Navy Department who was active in amateur radio organizations, died Saturday at his home in Berhesda after a heart attack.

He came to this area in 1950 and worked for the Navy's Weapons Development Bureau, where he helped design Navy electronic equipment, before retiring in 1970.

Mr. McConaghy was a member of the board of the American Radio Relay League from 1970 to 1979, and was a member of the Quarter Century Wireless Association. He was a member of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Washington.

He was a native of Camden, N.J. and a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania where he earned a degree in electronics engineering. He was a radio broadcast station engineer in Pa, in the 1920's and 1930's.

He served as a Navy aviator in the Pacific during World War II, and was a retired commander in the Naval Reserves. He joined the Navy Department as a civilian research engineer in Pa. after the war.

Survivors include his wife, Rae Easterday McConaghy, and a daughter, Linda Durbin, both of Bethesda, and two grandchildren.

Dear Dale,

It has been some time since I have had any correspondence with you concerning my RFI legal action. In the recent appeal, to the Appellate Division, State Superior Court, State of New Jersey, the appeal was heard on September 14, 1981 at which time the case was presented to a panel of three (3) judges.

On September 25, 1981 a ruling was issued in favor of the township of Winslow, State of New Jersey. I have enclosed a copy of the ruling for your information.

As you can see, by the letter from my attorney, the next step would be the New Jersey Supreme Court, if they would agree to hear the case. I am not sure what recourse I would have if the Supreme Court of New Jersey refused to hear the case.

I will be in touch with my attorney to start the proceedings for the supreme court, however, I am not sure I will be able to continue the fight. The last thing I want to do is back away from this legal confrontation if funding can be secured for continuance of the matter.

If you will advise me of the League's position, on both financial help as well as direct legal assistance from Robert Booth, it will greatly help me make this decision. I have already contacted the Mt. Airy VHF Club to ascertain the members position concerning continuing the case. I will be soliciting opinions of other groups as well. Once my attorney has outlined a fee schedule to me, and a determination has been made as to support from the amateur population I will be in a better position to make a stand as to continuing on.

As I mentioned above I am instructing my attorney to file the certification with the Supreme Court so as not to lose the right to appeal after October 14, 1981. I feel that the case can be dropped later if sufficient funding can not be attained, but if I wait for an assessment of funding to start the proceedings then the 30 days period will expire.

To sum up my position on this matter I am willing to continue this fight until a victory is attained, providing adequate funding becomes available. Unfortunately, I do not have the financial resources to go the distance alone. With adequate support the case goes on; without, I stop here.

A quick answer is not expected, nor do I feel it is needed since we have some time once the certification is filed. I will advise you of any further developments as they happen.

HR REPORT NUMBER 351 OCTOBER 9, 1981 Received 10/13/81

Senator Goldwater's Pro-amateur radio bill was passed by the Senate September 25 by unanimous consent. This important legislation, S.929, would affect not only the Amateur Service but also CB and radio control licensees as well as the electronics manufacturing industry.

Establishment of RFI susceptibility standards for the TV and home entertainment electronics industry could well be the most significant result of this comprehensive bill, if it becomes law. It would vest in the FCC the authority to set such standards, as a means of reducing the escalating RFI problems. It would also increase the term of an Amateur license from five to 10 years, while a last-minute amendment by Senator Goldwater would also

permit the FCC to discontinue the licensing of CB and radio control operators entirely, a deregulatory measure that has received some support from both FCC staff and Commissioners recently. In addition, it would specifically exemp Amateur transmissions from the secrecy provisions (Section 605) of the Communications Act. Though it was long assumed that Amateurs were not included in Section 605 coverage, recent legal decisions have generally applied its limitations to Amateur operations.

The Commission could enlist volunteer assistants from both the Amateur Radio and CB communities, under still another provision of S.929. These volunteers would be permitted to work directly with FCC engineers in monitoring both Amateur and CB frequencies for unlicensed or improper operations. Amateur Radio licensees would also be permitted to serve as volunteer examiners for "entry level" Amateur license applicants, a long-standing practice that has recently been termined "illegal" under present laws by the FCC legal staff.

One key provision of S.929, as introduced by Senator Goldwater, was not included in the bill the Senate passed. This was the provision that would have given the Commission the power to restrict the purchase of transmitting equipment to those having the appropriate license to use it. Though generally supported by the Amateur community, this provision contradicts the deregulatory philosophy of the present administration.

The next step for S.929 is in the House of Representatives, where it could be tied to appropriate legislation already pending there. More likely, it will be considered by itself, possibly replacing existing legislation such as Rep. Dannemeyer's HR 2203. It will go to the House Committee on Communications, chaired by Rep. Timothy Wirth, and it's possible that some action could be taken on it by early next year.

Support of S.929 by amateurs, expressed to their Representatives, should help to keep the bill moving toward passage.




