Four memories are also built into the HT, as is a priority channel. Frequency is read out on a 5 digit LED display. VHF/UHF REPORT by Jo, W2EIF

The six meter band has opened occasionally in June but the openings from EPA/SNJ area have been spotty and rather brief. This a disappointment to many after hearing about all the DX that was available to SA and the South and West earlier this year. Even during the June VHF QI Party it was spotty. The Texas stations seemed to have had the best openings during the contest with all sections available.

The contest period was very good on all bands thru 1296 in this area. There was a very good tropo opening along the East Coast late Sunday evening that extended at least to Nova Scotia; with stations in that area being worked on 144 and 432. Simplex channels in this area were being dominated by stations in NH! There were five stations in South Jersey on 1296! For the record, the following stations were heard or worked on that band: W3CCX/3, W3BBS, W3HFY in EPA; W2EIF, N2SB/2, K2BWR, W3CXU/2, and WB2RVX in SNJ; W1EJ in NH; K1FO and K1PXE in Conn; W2SZ/1 in W. Mass; AB2J in ENY; K4QIF in VA; and W1JR, W1XM in E.Mass. and W2DWJ in NNJ. It is pleasant to note that the contest seemed to be operated very politely and smoothly by all operators.

There was a fine opening on 6 and particulary on 2 in this area during the evening hours of June 24th and again in the morning on 6 meters on the 25th.

Good Show! What more can be said - with the exception of a few set-up glitches, ie the Prez proof testing the 1296 dishs' durability (a one round bout with a substatial tree limb which incidentally the dish lost); a breakdown in the 6 meter station prior to starting time; our effort in the JUNE VHF QSO PARTY came off very well.

A preliminary review of the logs indicates an outstanding performance on all bands, which should give the Pack Rats an excellent shot at our goal (a sweep of both the January and June VHF Contests for 1979), but only the final results will confirm it

The Atlanta Ham Festival was attended by about 7000 Hams. The new dealers exhibits were in the Hall of Nations at the Marriott; while directly across the street in a five story parking garage the Flea Market was held.

The flea market had about 300 plus sellers. In the writers mind, most everything was "junk" getting really high prices. Another Ham from this area, not a Pack Rat, made the remark that the Pack Rat flea market HAMARAMA put this one to shame.

The dealers displaying but not selling their new equipemnt were Kenwood, Hy Gain, Hal, Icom, and Hustler. The other dealers were pricing their goods at list or at the most 10% off. The best buy was the Microwave Module at \$260 for the 28 IF in, 432 out.. this one lists for \$319.

On sunday at 1:30 PM, the door prize drawings took place in the Grand Ball Room and abot \$10,000 in prizes were given away. (note: every one was won bya 4 call area Ham- hi)

TWENTY YEARS OF AMATEUR RADIO

C.B. DeSoto

From June 1934 QST - continued

In February 1919, the A.R.R.L. Board met again. In March they voted to reorganize the League. At a meeting on March 29th they ordered the publication of a minature issue of QST to announce the reorganization—but there was only \$33 in the treasury. The dozen men present dug into their own pockets for enough to finance the first issue. Lieut. Kenneth B. Warner, formerly 9JT of Cairo, Ill., was elected paid secretary. At a meeting on May 3rd the Finance Committee proposed borrowing \$7500 from League members, in return issuing certificates of indebtedness payable in two years with interest at 5% per annum. They voted to buy QST. Secretary Warner was ordered to lay plans for producing the first issue. Since that issue—June 1919 — QST has been published uninterruptedly for fifteen years.

The A.R.R.L.'s first job on reorganization was to get the wartime transmitting ban lifted. Secretary of the Navy Daniels blocked every move until October. Then:

THE JOB IS DONE, AND THE A.R.R.L. DID IT

WE'RE OFF:

The picture of the situation was literal. An immediate headlong rush to get on the air took place. Manufacturers were hard put to supply apparatus fast enough. Each night saw additional dozens of stations joyously crashing out over the air. GANGWAY! KING SPARK!

Grown now to full maturity, developed and perfected by years of pre-war and war experience, it reached its highest peak in the succeeding eighteen months. Glorious old sparks! Night after night they boomed and echoed down the air lanes. Night after night the mighty chorus swelled, by ones, by twos, by dozens, until the crescendo thunder of their Stentor bellowings shook and jarred the very Universe. A thousand voices clamored for attention. Five-hundred-cycle's hip metallic ring. The resonant organ basso of the sixty-cycle "sync". The harsh resounding snarief the straight rotary.

Character: Nervous, impatient sparks, hurrying petulantly. Clean-cut business-like sparks batting steadily along at a thirty-word clip. Good-natured sparks that drawled lazily and ended in a throaty chuckle as the gap coasted downhill for the sign-off.

Survival of the fittest. Higher and higher powers were the order of the day.

The race was on, and the devil take the hindmost. Interference. Lord, what interference! Bedlam! Well, it could not be Utopia. (TO BE CONTINUED)

SCM NOTES By Bill, WB2LGG SCM S.N.J.

This seems like a good point in time to describe the duties of the SCM and other section officials. Many people have commented to me that they are not really familiar with what an SCM does, many did not even know an SCM existed. This I hope to remedy at this time.

The SCM oversees the operation of the ARRL Communications Department in his section, in this case Southern New Jersey. The main function of the Communications Department is to operat the Amateur Radio Public Service Corps, comprised of both the National Traffic System and the Amateur Radio Emergency Service. It is my primary responsibility to keep these two organizations running smoothly, by appointing the leadership officials for our section and conferring with them on matters of general policy. More about the ARPSC next month.

Another function of the SCM is to issue station appointments. These consist of the Official Observer, Official Traffic Station, Official Emergency Station, Official VHF Station, and Official Bulletin Station. Stations applying for these positions involve themselves in that particular branch of the hobby that the appointment specifies. The appointees also report monthly to the SCM on their activities, to keep him and the membership informed of what they are doing. If you are interested in exploring a particular phase of ham radio in more depth and feel that one of these appointments might be for you, please contact me for an application and complete details.

The SCM also might be able to help with any problems regarding contests or awards. These are both handled directly by Headquarters, but if you are having trouble in one of these areas please contact me and I'll see what I can do. For that matter, if you have any problems with Headquarters that you just can't seem to get resolved, let me know and I'll see what can be done. While I'me not a miracle worker, sometimes a call from me to the right person works wonders. I'll not offer any guarantees, however!

Feel free to contact me at anytime about anything that concerns you. My address and phone number are always in the front of QST. Next month we'll discuss the in-depth workings of the Amateur Radio Public Service Corps. Until then, very 73.

* * * SPECIAL TO CHEESBITS By Pete, WA30VH

In trying to make our radio hobby more interesting, available and accessible to new members of the Club, it occurred to me how nice it would be if one of the Pack Rat stations were open on a prescheduled basis, perhaps initially on a once a month trial plan, listed ahead of time in Cheese-Bits. The program might be called and captioned in Cheese-Bits: "HOST OF THE MONTH". Having previously requested volunteers, one station would then be listed as being that month's host station, to be open the FOURTH Monday evening (same night each month) with perhaps two or three ahead to be listed each month. On the designated night, members visiting the Host station should sign the guest book, and would then be introduced over the air on each of the nets in which the host station normally participates. In this way, visitors could see one or more stations actually on the air, and see in person some of the equipment configurations in use by other members. To prevent pileups of visitors, the name and phone number should be listed each month of the monthly host station so that the number of visitors could be limited if necessary.


Thanks to Bruce, WA3YUE, for bringing the June meeting refreshments.






