The sporadic E season has been very short this year - at least in this part of the country I know of only 2 six meter openings so far this month. August there was an opening to the midwest and VEl land, and on August 10 there was an opening to the West Coast.

PENNA. SUPREME COURT RULINGS ON ANTENNA TOWERS (Thanks to Paul, WB3HHO)

Relying on the doctrine that a zoning ordinance is to be strictly construed, the Supreme Court has held that a 32' ham radio mast is permitted as a use accessory to a single family dwelling. Lord Appeal, 368 Pa. 121, 81 A. 2d 533 (1951).

An ordinance which sets a 35' height for structures cannot be applied to prohibit the erection of a 50' ham radio antenna, necessary for broadcasting over long distances. Appeal Schmigle v. Board of Adjustment, 114 Pitts, L.J. 117(1966). Note: The court indicated that an attempt to restrict ham radio antennas to a height less than necessary for effective long range communication would be unconstitutional. See also, Appeal of Slemenda, 115 Pitts, L.J. 223 (1967).

FROM N6NB'S AUGUST 1978 VHF NEWSLETTER CONTROVERSIAL RULES

Since the write-up on the new contest in QST was attributed to N6NB, some people have assumed I wrote all the rules. Several UHFers called with polite and not-so polite expressions of dismay at some of the rules!

As anyone who has ever worked in a legislative or committee-based process knows, many, many changes occur between the initial idea and the emergence of the final product. Actually, many people have urged the ARRL staff to create a UHF contest over the years.

What your author did was to draft a proposed set of rules for such an event and "jawbone" the Contest Advisory Committee into voting for the event. "Jawbone" is a word used advisedly, by the way, since several HF contest enthusiasts on the committee strenuously opposed the idea of adding another activity for those esoteric ivory-cloud types who operate the UHF bands!

After it left the CAC, there were two major changes in the rules--one that I wholeheartedly supported and one that I reluctantly supported because it was obviously a necessary change.

One of the best ideas for the UHF contest came from K1ZZ, a high-ranking HQ staffer who is best known for his HF activities but who has an amazing familiarity with VHF matters. The suggestion to use longitude and latitude as the basis for multipliers was his--and I think of we get used to the system, we'll want to buy him a gold engraved map of the United States, divided into one-degree segments!

The other change was one nobody really liked, but saw as necessary. My original rule draft cut off 220 activity as 222.1 mHz, banning the most popular 220 FM channels. That would have made it virtually an SSB-CW contest, since the most popular 450 FM frequencies were also off limits. However, the fact is that 99 per cent of all 220 activity (100 per cent in some areas) is on FM. So the ARRL, an organization committed to serving all amateurs and not just one interest, had to choose between a contest that would be open only to the few and one open to the many. Obviously, it had to be opened up to everyone.

"Well, then, why didn't 446 mHz FM make it," I've been asked. The answer, of course, is the thanks to Oscar and those ubiquitous black boxes from England, there splenty of SSB activity on 432—and little 446 FM activity in most of the country. When someone makes a black box for 220 SSB—and many hundreds of amateurs buy them—we can certainly have another look at the rules on 220. Your author has long had a homebrew kilowatt on 220 SSB, and recently published an article to encourage more 220 SSB activity. I would have every reason to favor an SSB contest. But unfortunately, until commercial gear is available for SSB, most 220 activity will remain on FM, a fact that couldn't be ignored.

Remember that any first-time contest has rough edges, and will need refining. Try it this weekend, and then forward your reactions to Tom Frenaye at ARRL headquarters. He'll send your views along to the CAC so we can study those refinements. (EDITORS NOTE: The August 5-6 UHF Contest)

WORKING AT THE OTHER END OF THE SPECTRUM - ALMOST

A couple of weeks back I received a call from Harry, W3CL who asked if I would be willing to help a friend of his put up an antenna. I told Harry that as long as I did nt have to stand on a roof or climb a ladder that I would be glad to render any assistance that I could.

On Sunday August 20th at 1PM I received a phone call from Ed Keener, W3AJS saying he was ready to raise the vertical starting at 4:30PM (Ed is fondly know as W3CL's "Nemesis"). I had visions of something that resembled an 18AVT/WB so I said sure I would be glad to help. Ed assured me that it would'nt take too long to finish the job. I then called Carl, K3DLS and got him to join me as well as providing transport. He was looking forward to be a part of the old timers antenna raising party.

We arrived at Ed's QTH in Oreland, Pa. in good time. After an exchange of pleasantries, he escourted us around to the back of the house where we came face to face with the "MONSTER", designed to operate on 80 and 160 meters. The antenna is a piece of four inch diameter, 70 feet long aluminum irrigation pipe. It is the largest amateur antenna I have ever encountered!

We could not start the project immediately since Ed lives next door to the 15th fairway of a golf couse and we had to wait until the players finished their turns. We finally got started at 5:30PM when some of Ed's nabors arrived to give a helping hand. The pole was taken up and place almost to the middle of the fairway and then one of the guy ropes was tied to the bumper of Ed's car.

I was ordered to stand under a pine tree to serve as an anchor man (I am 6'6" tall and a bit on the hefty side). Carl was general labor, anything that needed doing. My job was to pull on three guy ropes some of them passing through the branches of a tree. Ed started by backing up the car and pulling the antenna up from the horizontal. When the pole was about about 30° off horizontal some of the tree branches reached out and tangled up with the guy ropes. It took some doing to get this mess straightened out with Carl maneuvering in gnome-like fashion to untangle tree branches with a ten foot pole with a hook in one end. Ed sure anticipated this problem b having that pole handy.

So here is the picture. I am stationed at the base of the pine tree with needles and sap dropping all over me while I'm hanging on to three guy ropes and pulling like a madman. Ed is running back and forth to his car, moving it first out towards the street (his xyl directing traffic), and then closer to the garage. 

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
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
