

NEW PRODUCTS OF INTEREST TO HAMS By Lyn, W3NSI

- 1. SSB/CW 432 T/R: The Icom IC 402 Matches the 2 meter twin IC 202 in size and layout. The unit can be set up for several 200 Hkz segments in the 430-435.5 Mhz band. Output is rated at 3 PEP, and receiver sensitivity is .5 uv for 10db sinad. Power is supplied by 9-C cells, or a nicad pack. Price, approx. \$375.
- Two Meter FM T/R: The new Icom IC 280 covers the entire 2M band with either 1 or 10 watts of RF output. Receiver sensitivity is rated .6 uv for 20 Db quieting. Any 3 frequencies may be punched into the control head and recalled at will. These 3 channels will be retained in the memory even with the unit shut off. The front panel can be unpluged from the main frame and mounted remotely. Frequency readout is on a 3 digit LED panel display. Price \$432. - 3. Counter Pre-amp PA 800: DSI Instruments has just introduced a pre-amp rated at 15db gain from 20-800 Mhz. This has the effect of increasing sensitivity of a counter from 100mv to 12 mv over this frequency range. Unit operates on 8-13 VDC and also has a 115 Vac supply. Pre-amp is constructed in a cast aluminum box and has coax input and output fittings on each end. Price \$70. 7914 Ronson Road, No. G. San Diego, CA. 92111.

VHF/UHF REPORT By Jo. W2EIF

The big news this time concerns the big tropo opening of August 20,21,22,23 and 24. The bands, 144 and 432 were wide open for much of the period from the East Coast to Iowa, Missouri and all points between. It well may be the best opening yet observed. At least in my experience. I was able to work Iowa and Missouri, Ill, Ind. Ohio, Michigan and heard Ky. on 432. It isn't well known but every year during the period August 15 to 25 there occurs a good tropo opening, but usually not as extensive as the recent one.

The September VHF contest was good as usual with N6NB/l on Mt. Equinox operating on all bands. It made Vt. easy - TNX, Wayne! The weather conditions for the contest were not very good but lots of contacts were available. I was disappointed about the 220 activity. It seems to have dropped off on the low end but picked up for 220 FM. WA3AXV worked about 11 sections using this mode and the repeater vertical antenna. It would appear that bigger antennas and more power plus more sensitive receivers should be prepared for the January VHF Contest.

144 MHZ Tropo on August 20,21,22,23 By Howard Sherer, WB2RBG/3

During this period I experienced some of the best tropo conditions that I have seen for my 13 yrs. on 2 meters. The band opened at approx. 9 PM local time on Sunday 8/20. Signals from Ark., Okla., Miss., Mo., Ill., Ind., Mich., Oh., were reported worked in this area. I regret that I was not on the air Sunday evening to work some of this choice DX. By this time, I was looking for some long haul from the 5th District but had no success that night. Many of the stations worked during this 3 day period were running low power 10W and single 9 to 11 el. beams. I understand that 432 Mhz was also very good during this period. The period of 10 days before these openings also produced some good tropo with stations from N.B., Que., Ont., Me., N.H., Oh., Mi. having good signals. 
220 MHZ PRE-AMP By Ron Whitsel, WA3AXV

Many of the 220 MHZ boxes are somewhat lacking in receiver sensitivity. Most that I have measured are usually in the .3 to .4 UV, for 20 DB of quieting, range. While this is not too bad for localwork, long range communication becomes easier with greater sensitivity.

The pre-amp shown in figure I was developed for use in the mobile installation which I described in previous issues of Cheese Bits. 1,2 Parts are not critical and any reasonable layout should produce excellent results. Gain will be 10 to 12 db which will take the average transceiver down to .1 uv for 20 db of quieting.



FROM HR REPORT
Sept. 22, 1978

CANADA'S NO-CODE AMATEUR LICENSE goes into effect September 30, with the first exams scheduled for November 15. The "Amateur Digital Radio Operator's Certificate" gives the holder operating privileges on 2 meters and up and includes packet (computer-to-computer data bursts) and pulse as well as more conventional modulation modes.

Packet Radio Transmissions will be permitted on 220.1 -220.5 MHZ, shared with other modulation modes, while 221-223 and 433-434 MHz will be reserved exclusively for packet radio use. Packet would also be permitted on 24.00-24.01 GHz. Each packet transmission would require a "header" that would include the ASCII-coded call sign of the transmitting station, and no secret codes or ciphers would be permitted. Technical characteristics and modulation techniques for packet radio are to be determined by "Amateur experimentation."

Pulse Transmission will be permitted on two subbands in the Amateur VHF/UHF spectrum; P and P on 145.5-145-8 MHz and P $_0$, P $_1$, P $_2$ and P $_3$ on 434-434.5 MHz, with P $_0$ through P $_5$ plus P $_9$ on the 1215-1300 Mhz bands and higher. Though any Canadian licensees will be permitted use of packeradio, passage of an additional test on the relevant portion of the new Amateur Digital Radio Operator's Certificate exam will be required of other licensees who wish to use pulse transmission

Holders of The New no-code Canadian certificate may upgrade to the Canadian "Advanced" certificate simply by passing a 15 WPM code test, but must wait one year after initial licensing before becoming eligible to do so. Canadian Amateurs may now also retain credit for passing a CW test for up to one year after it's taken, even though the written test was failed. Amateur exams will now be given four times appualty in Toronto.
