NEW PRODUCTS OF INTEREST TO HAMS By Lyn, W3NSI

1. Kenwood TS 700SP: It has been about 3 years since the early model TS 700 came onto the market. Since that time, many changes have been made. A demo, unit was made available by Trevose Electronics, so that a more detailed series of tests could be run on this unit. The digital readout on this "S" model (which is now standard). really makes operating a pleasure. On CW-AM-SSB the frequency is read to 100 Hz. On FM the 7th digit is not used (.1 Khz). An RF preamp is now a built in feature and can be switched in and out from the front panel. You will only notice a difference on very weak signals. A sidetone osc. is now built into the unit for CW monitoring. The volume on this circuit can be adjusted inside the cabinet. In fact, there are a lot of little knobs just inside the top cover. These cinlude FM and SSB, mic. gain, and AM carrier level. As received, this latter has to be adj. as a full 10 watts of output were noted on AM operation. The control was adjusted to bring this level down to the rated 3 watts. This was the only flaw noted in the entire test procedure. A set of contacts is available on the back of the radio to use for control of other station equipment. An external speaker jack is also mounted in the rear. I would prefer the key jack on the front panel (it is now on back), but, since the key does not affect operation in other modes, it can be left plugged in at all times.

Power measurements were made over the entire band, and at least 10 watts output was obtained from end to end. There is a handle on one end and rubber feet on the other to facilitate moving the set from place to place. Since the unit weight is 24 lbs., this will not be everyday operation. The SP model, which is the only one now being sold, is partly set up for the new repeater segment at 144.5 to 145.5 Mhz. I say partly because the PC board to accomplish this feat is installed, but, the crystal is supplied at the time of this writing, taped to the instruction sheet for this operation. It is necessary for the new owner to take the top cover off, install the crystal, and calibrate the circuit with a frequency counter.

Receiving sensitivity was very good, especially on SSB. All things considered, a very satisfying piece of equipment. Price \$759.00.

- 2. Two Meter Hand Held T/R S1: Tempo (Henry Radio) is bringing a 6 1/2" high 2 M H/T to market, which will be able to transmit or receive on 800 channels. Reported to be the first synthesized H/T, the unit operates on 9.6 volts DC. Output is rated at 1 1/2 watts. Price \$349. 11240 W. Olympic Blvd., Los Angeles, Calif. 90064.
- 3. Ten-Tec HF T/R: The new OMNI transceiver model 545 (546 digital) will be on sale shortly. The unit covers 160-10 meters with a power of 200 watts, SSB and CW. The digital version uses 6 LED readouts .43" high, which indicate frequency to 100 hz. T/R is 14 x 14 x 6 inches and is fully solid state. One unusual feature is a built in squelch circuit. Price \$899. (\$1069 digital) Sevierville, Tenn. 37862 (Ten-Tec)
- 4. VHF Converters: Low noise receiving converters are now being sold by Advanced Receiver Research Co. Three models are available, all built into die cast alum. cases. The IF frequency is 28-30 Mc. Noise figure is 1.5 to 2 db. Operating voltage is 10-16 volts, and current drain is 25 Ma. Ranges are R50VD 50-52 Mc, R144VD 144-146 Mc, and R220VD 220-222 Mc. Price \$48. Box 1242, Brulington, Ct. 05013.

VHF/UHF REPORT By Jo, W2EIF

The six meter band has supplied somethingspleasant so far this month. Nov 1 and 2 produced good openings to South America. Signals were in from 7:30 A.M. to 2:30 P.M. EST in this area.

On Nov. 1, K4ERO/HC in Quito Ecquador, was in very strong. Those working him should QSL via N6CL. Singlas were also heard from TI2NA, FY7AS, and a PZ1AE. The lucky ones were those that stuck with the band and eventually working LU8AHW. WA2DPU, W2BN and K3MWV were among the locals that made the grade.

VHF/UHF REPORT CONTINUED

The band also opened on the 2nd with K4ERO/HCl predominating. He was near 50.125 which apparently is a repeater input (FM) in Columbia. The repeater could be heard at 50.075 approx. With a lot of garble apparently from the many SSB stations calling K4ERO/HCl.

WB2RBG/3 reports that he made a contact with G3CSE near London who using a 150' long wire antenna was copying 1's 2's and 3's on 50 Mhz with signal peaking at 10 AM EST. Signals were strong and G3CSE suggests that when the band is open to S.A. some of the 6 meter boys should put their beams on England call CQ and say that they are listening between 28.7 and 28.8 Mhz. Some cross band contacts could result!

Nov. 7 and 11 produced aurora openings which apparently were good on six meters,

but not much was heard on 2 meters.

Nov. 14 produced another six meter opening to the South. This time the contact was KZ5NW. He was worked by W2AXU.

Not much to report on 2 meters and up this time. Keep an ear out for signals to the South and West on 6 meters particularly between now and December 15.

The 21st Hamfest sponsored by the Foundation for Amateur Radio at the fairgrounds in Gaithersburg, Md. was held as scheduled on October 8. Fair but cool weather prevailed, but it was not even a close second to the snowstorm of four years ago. A number of cold noses were seen, and relief from hot coffee was difficult due to the extremely long lines at the one and only food service. It seems that other problems crop up when one is solved. They have eliminated the huge early morning rush by reserving tables and allowing set-up the night before, but the rank amateurs who manned the food line caused much gnashing and chattering of teeth. This was coupled by the new pricing policy of charging the unheard of price of \$15.00 a space for anyone who has attended more than three flea markets this year. COAXIAL CABLE NOTE

Buyers take caution when purchasing the following: RG8U, RG59U and RG58U. These cables have been taken off the Mil Spec list and are now graded as commercial coax.

The reason is the high cost of the copper used for the braid. The braid coverage has been reduced to a bare minimum, therefore reducing the shielding capabilities.

Another factor to observe is that the outer jacket in the commercial grade cable is of the contaminating type. The jacket contains a plasticizer to keep it flexible during manufacturing which, after processing, leaches through shield braid into the polyethlyene insulation. This causes a change in the electrical characteristics of the insulation and increases cable losses. The losses occur after approximately one year.

The cables to use are the military spec's RG58C/U, RG59B/U and RG213/U (former RG8/U).

Their jacket is of the new non-contaminating type with the following advantages: long life jacket, abrasion resistant, sunlight damage proof, may be buried underground and has a life span of 10 to 20 years.
