

OFFICIAL BULLETIN NR 628 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS NEWINGTON CT JANUARY 13 1977 TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT. In a public notice released January 10, the FCC announced the implementation of an instant upgrading program. Effective March 1, Engineers in Charge of the various FCC field offices will be delegated authority to issue interim amateur permits to applicants for amateur operator licenses who successfully complete the examination and who already hold an amateur license. This interim permit will indicate a special ID which must be appended to the amateur station call whenever the operator utilizes his newly earned privileges. Further details will be carried over WlAW and in QST when available. We emphasize that this instant upgrading program does not take effect until March 1 AR

A connector is provided on the rear panel with a two position switch that selects the power level. VHF/UHF REPORT by Jo, W2EIF

The January ARRL VHF Sweepstakes for 1977 is now history. The skip conditions that we had last year was not evident during this contest, nevertheless it was a very good contest. My score indicates that 2 meter activity showed a good increase with a decline on 6 meters. This was to be expected with the big influx of 2 meter SSB low power commercial gear. When similiar gear becomes available for 6 meters, maybe we will see a menewal of activity on that band.

There is always a lot of CW activity on 2 meters during any VHF contest. The current January affair was no exception. Of my 235 contacts on 2 meters, 30 were on AM; 85, SSB; 49, FM; and 71, CW. By contrast, only 19 CW contacts were made on 6 meters. It is relatively easy to knock off 19 or more sections from this area on 2 meter CW.

I think it is time for the ARRL headquarters gang to do some thinking about the January contest date. Contests should not be held on holidays or close to them and certainly not on dates when nationally televised events are scheduled. Working a contest during a world series or a superbowl football game is sheer nonsense! Amateurs are not only contestors but many of us are also football fans. In addition, any TVI which may be ignored by nabors normally is much more likely to create lasting enemies if observed during a nationally televised event. I quit during the recent superbowl affair to watch and when it got dull went back on the air but NOT ON 6 METERS even though my own set is free of interference.

I suggest that the ARRL determine the date of the 1978 SuperBowl and set the VHF SS contest date on the following week-end. The ProBowl game on that week-end is played on Monday nite so no conflict. It will also be far enough away from New Years so that all hangovers are cured.

For anyone interested, K1PXE, WA3JUF, W3HMU and W2EIF meet on 144.020 MHZ SSB on Thursday evenings at 8PM preparatory to going to 1296. We use CW and operate between 1296.0 and 1296.1-

Editors Note: Pack-Rat Tony, K4AWS of Sumterville, Fla. reports unusual band conditions on 6 and 2 meters the evening of January 16th from 7PM to 10:56PM. RESPONSES TO THE PACK RAT COLOMBIAN DX PEDITION By Tony, W3HMU

The Pack Rat Dxpedition to Colombia took place in the last week of July and the first week of August, 1976. This Dxpedition provided the first 432 MHz EME contacts from South America to fifteen EME stations around the world. Additionally, it provided the first Colombi QSOs on Oscar 7B to over 50 stations who pursue this space-age aspect of our hobby.

Six months have elapsed since the Dxpedition and during that time several articles and news stories have been written about the project. The project realized a very high QSL return which is typical of a Dxpedition to a rare country. Several participants wrote letters in addition to their QSL comments. Congratulatory correspondence was received also from amateur organizations.

Realizing that the members of Mt. Airy VHF Radio Club would like to read these kudos and comments we have received, I have excerpted a number of these from the correspondence and organized them below, thus we can share again the results of that memorable project in which we all played a part.

The first two are from letters to the Pack Rats from sister organizations and comment on the expedition as a whole. The first is from our "friendly enemies" across the river, The South Jersey Radio Association.

August 31, 1976

But SM5LE called us on the telephone and said that he could relay a message by telephone to you and rearrange the schedules. On our first sked we heard you good at first and then the signals became fluttery and disappeared before we could receive your acknowledgement of our signal. (We had high winds - Tony). On the next day, we heard your QSO with K2UYH and when you came back to our call it was a great thrill here. What a signal! Solid "O" copy! Can you send photos of the expedition for me to use for an article in our local radio magazine? Thanks to all of you Pack Rats, 73" SM5LE

From Jan, PAØSSB - "Many, many thanks for your FB FB EME -Dxpedition. I really admire your group for this excellent expedition and all the work that was done. I think it was the greatest amateur happening ever for organization, technology, etc. My compliments I will write an article in our local magazine (Electron) about it."

From Cor, VE7BBG - "Many thanks for a fine effort and the first VE-South America I am glad so many stations were able to work HK1TL. Congratulations to 70 cm contact. everyone involved with the HK expedition for a first class job."



MARIO, W3ELX WINS THE ' CRYING TOWEL '

(Transcribed from a tape recording made by Ric, WA3UDS during the meeting on January 20th)

" My troubles started when my beams had gotten out of rotation. So I decided to throw a rope

over the beams and pull them around to where they belong. Well, I pulled the beams around OK, but broke the rotor ring gear, the drive gear plus the stop. Don (W3CJU) and Walt (K3BPP) gave me a rotor motor each. Well, we let the tower down and laid it on a dump truck furnished by a friend; took the broken rotor off; brought it into the shack, and took the other two apart for parts to repair mine. So after it was repaired, I proceeded to replace it on the tower. Got everything ready to raise the tower, willing hands and all. Well, someone was not where they were supposed to be. As the tower started up off the dump truck a guy wire slipped... the tower went to one side and dropped to the ground. The thrust bearing broke and the top of the tower bent. Being of Italian extraction with a cool mind. I calmly told everyone to please go home. They said 'You are not mad'; I said 'NO'....." "So I took off all the beams and put them in a neat pile. The next day took the piece of tower to the place where I used to work; had the tower section repaired and bought a new thrust bearing. They made a coupling for me to connect the two pipes together; put everything in the truck and took off for home. When I arrived home and unloaded everything found that the coupling was missing; somehow lost it on the way. 20° wind blowing. Sunday at 10 AM weather not bad. Started with the pipe then replaced all the beams on top of tower; got everyone set at their post; tower went up. All guys secured at 4:30.

Boy, what some guys wont do in the Winter time for a contest. Wait, this is not all."
