#### NEW PRODUCTS OF INTEREST TO HAMS BY Lyn, W3NSI

- Two Meter FM T/R: Regency has introduced their new HR 312 for 2 meter FM. Power output is rated at 35 watts, and both receiver and transmitter have their own channel switches. This makes it possible to set up a variety of T/R frequencies. Receive sensitivity is .25 mv for 20 db quieting, and adjacent channel selectivity is 75 db. This will help sort out those 15 Khz split channels. Price \$270, 7707 Records St., Indianapolis, Ind. 46226
- Two Meter Synthesizer: VHF Engineering Co. has just announced their new synthesizerll for use with a variety of 2 meter rigs. Frequency range is 140-149, 995Khz in 5 Khz steps. It will replace crystals in transmitters on 6,8,12 Mhz ranges and receiver crystals from 15 Mhz to 45 Mhz. This just about covers everything on the market. Price \$170(kit), \$240(wired), 320 Water St., P.O. Box 1921, Binghamton, N.Y. 13902
- Two Meter Synthesized T/R: Henry Radio is now selling the Tempo VHF 1 (made in Japan) and Tempo SSB 1, which is an accessory for the above. Frequency readouts are on a 5 digit LED display, and the entire band 144-148 is covered in 5 Khz jumps. Transmitter output is 10 watts, with the repeater splits being automatic. Price \$495, SSB1 \$225.

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#### VHF/UHF REPORT By Jo. W2EIF

The VHF/UHF bands were amazingly quiet up to the June Contest. One would have thought that a lot of stations would have been on testing and trying out the various rigs. There have been some good tropo openings up and down the coast but the activity has not been sufficient to determine how far it extends. I have heard the Norfolk stations very strong on 2 meters with nothing heard from North Carolina.

Six meters sometimes seems dead but if you get on and call CQ or even put out a test signal you may be surprised at what pops back at you. I was testing on 6 the other day and the band seemed dead but raised an S9 Texas station for a nice QSO. The West Coast has been coming through occasionally for some nice contacts. There may have been a good tropo opening to the North East on June 8th as I was able to work K1PXE (Conn) with 5-8,9 signals both ways. Did not notice similiar activity on 6 & 2meters or 220 & 432 Mhz. The K1PXE contact was on 1296 Mhz.

The contest produced the usual activity and as usual some 20 ---- sections were available on 2 meters with several North Carolina and Maine stations available. The only section I did not hear was Vermont. All things considered the contest was a pretty active period. All bands seemed to be active even late in the contest.

The September QSO Party this year is on the 11th and 12th.. it comes more quickly than you think so plan ahead.

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#### JUNE VHF QSO PARTY REPORT by Bill Olsen, W3HQT

As I wake up this morning at 11:30 and stagger up to the shack. I realize that the June Contest is once again history. there it is all over my floor. boxes full of guy ropes, phasing lines, pencils, power supplies, amplifiers, receivers, spare tubes, clothing, converters, log sheets, empty beer cans, half a liverwurst and onion sandwich, microphones, pencil sharpeners, telegraph keys, bug-away lights, and everyone elses everything! There it will all sit too, (except for the liverwurst and onion sandwich) until some of the ole energy comes back and I want to ever look at a radio again.

Once again the Pack Rats have pulled off an incredible show of teamwork; operating expertise and dedicated hard work. This years' show was bigger and better than ever. An all time high of 47 Pack Rats, and over 100 visitors (some CB ers' I've heard - must have been quite a shock) came to see the operations on 6 meter CW/SSB/AM/FM, 2 meter CW/SSB/AM/FM, 220 CW/SSB/AM/FM, 432 CW/SSB, 432 MOONBOUNCE (!), 1296 CW, 2304 CW, and FM on 3,5, and 10 GHz.

Band captains... Ron, WA3AXV(6m), Bill, W3HQT(2m), Dave, WA3JUF(220), Harry, WA3NGK(432), Tony, W3HMU(432 EME), and Danny, WA3NFV(6&2m FM). All deserve a special commendation because there were hardly any equipment breakdowns the whole week end. It seemed to be the smoothest running June Contest ever. Of course there were crack operators at all positions also. Special mention must go to WA3YZC(6m), W3CXU and K2EVW(2m), WA3JUF(as usual 220), K3IUV(432), and our newest Pack Rat, WA3ZRE filling up log sheets on 2m FM along with hosts of others.

The most thrilling episode of the weekend was the 432 EME demonstration Saturday night. It was chilly, partly cloudy; the Moon was full and rising over the trees in the East; Tony,W3HMU was at the key of the worlds most ambitious portable 432 EME station. There was a murmer among the crowd of 50 or so awed spectators; a CBer shook his head in dismay; K3JJZ and WB3AOP were pointing the antenna, an array of 16-13 element Yagis (see the picture on page 6). A few adjustments were made and then the transmit/receive switch was flipped to transmit. A hush fell over the crowd; the CBer staggered a bit; W3HQT took a big swig of warm beer; the key was pressed and we quickly stood by. A weak but discernable echo was heard. Again the key was pressed—again an echo was heard. No contacts were made on EME due to some difficulties with the transmitter that were not found until after the Moon had set. When you consider that echoes were heard the first time out with a heretofore untried system, the demonstration has to be termed successful. The next time the system will be set up will be at the end of July in Barranquilla, Columbia, S.A., and the boys are very optomistic about the outcome.

Though all the logs are not thoroughly checked over, it looks like our score will be as good or better than last year even with activity on the bands seemingly less than in previous years. Conditions were average to good on 2 meters on up with good signals up and down the coast. The opening to the West Coast Sunday night on 6 meters sure was a shot in the arm.

Special thanks to Jo, W2EIF who was up at the site Friday morning assembling the 220 MHZ antenna system(so what else is new!); Ernie, W3KKN who came to the rescue with spares in the pinch; Joe, W3YXF "the coffee man" and Doc, K3GAS "the doughnut man". Of course thanks and congratulations to all that participated. See you all next year!



#### FCC ACTION ON RESTRUCTURING

The FCC has issued a Report and Order on Docket 20282- a first cut which is outlined as follows:

Full Novice priveleges for Technician Class licensees.

A Novice reaching the end of his license term can retest for a new Novice immediately; the one year wait is discontinued.

Novices may run 250 watts d.c. power input.

All licensees using the Novice segments of the bands are also limited to 250 watts. Full credit will be granted for examination elements previously completed by mail. Conditionals are "grandfathered" to General, Technicians(C) to Technician.

Element 2, the Novice written test, will be part of all exams.

The number of distinct license classes is reduced from 10 to 5 by this action. The future availability of mail exams is limited to Novices only, except in cases of physical disability (backed up by a physician's statement). These changes will be effective July 23, 1976.

OFFICIAL BULLETIN NR 592 FROM ARRL HEDQUARTERS NEWINGTON CT JUNE 3 1976 TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT In a Public Notice released June 3, 1976 the Federal Communications Commission announced approval of ARRL's Petition for Extention of Time in Docket 20777. This proposal, known as the bandwidth docket, would eliminate all mode restrictions from the amateur rules, and replace them with maximum bandwidths that may be used on various portions of the amateur bands regardless of the form of emission used. The new deadline for filing comments is August 4, 1976, with reply comments due September 3, 1976. Comments, with 11 copies if possible, should be sent to the FCC, Amateur and Citizens Division, Washington, DC 20554. Don't forget to send a copy to your ARRL director, whose address can be found on page 8 of QST. AR

#### RTTY ANTHOLOGY (PART 4) by Ralph Alexander, WA3FOF RECEIVING

One of the first things most people want to do after the aquisition of a teleprinter is to try to receive something off the air and several things are needed to accomplish this.

First, a very stable HF band receiver, preferably one with single side band capability. Next, a device called a Terminal Unit (TU) or RTTY converter. This unit is required to process the receiver output which is usually the audio at the speaker terminals. The RF from the last IF can also be used but most people will be using an audio TU. If an audio TU is used, a "T" pad is needed. An inexpensive pad may be an automobile front and rear speaker fader control. It is good practice to hear the RTTY tones and the fader control will allow the RTTY tones to be monitored at a comfortable level from the speaker; providing a reasonably constant signal to the TU. The input impedance of most Terminal Units is 600 ohms so one will need a matching transformer providing 8 ohms(speaker impedance) to 600 ohms. It is important to make this impedance match in order to prevent overloading the receiver audio. The circuit is shown on Figure 1.

The first stage in a TU is called the limiter which helps to even out variations in the output of the receiver. The next stage contains the channel filters which is the heart of the TU. Many devices were used for these audio filters such as small audio filter chokes and even television width coils. However, the filters that work the best are 88 milli-henry toroids. The "Butterworth Filter Circuit" uses three toroids per channel. The three channels are as follows: 2125 Hz for common MARK; 2295 Hz for 170 Hz shift SPACE; and 2975 Hz for 850 Hz shift SPACE with a switch to select between the two shifts. (Figure 2.) There are other ways of providing channel filters called "Phase Locked Loops" and the circuit changes can be made in the TU. This is not recommended for one getting started in RTTY.


To align each channel filter, use a calibrated audio generator fed to the filter with an AC VTVM to read the output of the filter, or use a receiver with a 100 Khz calibrator. Adjust the receiver BFO to produce the audio frequency fed to the filter with an AC VTVM and a frequency counter at the output of the filter. The tuning is done by the substitution of several good quality capacitors (Mylar, silver mica but not paper) added in parallel across the 88 mh. toroid until a sharp peak at the desired frequency is obtained. Tune each of the channel filters first and then build the components into the TU.

The next item that would be useful is a double-throw switch at the output of the channel filters. This switch will serve to flip over the output MARK and SPACE signals from the channel filters in case they are received inverted. (See Figure 2.)

The signal then travels to the keyer circuit using a tube with low plate resistance such as a 6Y6 or 6AQ5. Of course this circuit may be transistorized..... When a signal comes thru the TU, the keyer tube is biased to cut-off and no current flows; a SPACE condition. With no signal thru the TU; a MARK condition, the keyer tube is not biased and draws 60 ma. plate current (Max)

It is best to run the output of the keyer directly into a polar relay since the tube or transistor will have trouble handling the inductive reactance of the magnets of one machine. It is not possible to run two or more machines in series.

When starting out it is best to usea scope to tune the RTTY signal; any type scope will do. Connect the vertical plates to the output of the MARK filter and the horizontal plates to the output of the SPACE filter( the switch point shown in Figure 2.) Adjust the scope vertical and horizontal gain controls, with the internal sweep turned off, to obtain a cross pattern in order to tune in or monitor the RTTY signal. (continued next month)



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
