

NEW PRODUCTS OF INTEREST TO HAMS By Lyn, W3NSI

- 1. 80 Watt 2M FM Amplifier Kit Dycomm has added a kit type amplifier to their line of 2M FM equipment. This unit, the "Super D" will boost the output of a Clegg 27B to 80 watts output, from either mobile or fixed station (11-15 VDC power required). The unit wired and tested sells for \$150, and it appears that this will be a limited time offer at this kit price of \$49.95. 948 Ave. E. P.O. Box 10116, Riviera Beach, Fla. 33404
- 2. Base Station Control Unit 2M Pace #P5407 This unit manufactured by Pace Div. of Pathcom Inc. can be used to check SWR, power output in 3 ranges (5,50, and 500 watts), and audio quality. The 5 and 50 watt ranges use a built in dummy load, while the 500 watt range samples the RF in the line on the way to the antenna system. When RF is passing through the unit, an "on the air" sign lights on the front panel. A TVI filter is also built in. Pace Communications, Box 306 Harbor City, Calif. 90710
- 3. Metrum II 2M FM Trans/Rec. Motorcla has now made available two high quality FM transceiver units, one running 10 watts out, the other 25 watts out. Both have a 1 watt switchable option, for local QSOs. One crystal is required for both transmit and receive in simplex mode, rather than one for each as on most rigs. For repeater operation, selected from the front panel (push hutton), an "offset" crystal must be purchased. Unit is shipped with 146.94 installed in one of the 12 channels. A preamp is built into the microphone. Price \$400 & \$500 (10 & 25 watt) Motorcla Dealers have more information.

CD NEWS BY TOM GIBSON, W3EAG

Montgomery County Civil Defense has inaugurated radioteletype service for its network of radio amateur volunteers known as the Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service. The first broadcast was Monday, December 3rd, from network control station W3EAG, Norristown Pa. The National Weather Service zone forecasts for eastern Pennsylvania are transmitted each day Monday through Friday at 6:15 PM on frequencies of 52.60 MHz and 146.835 MHz. Following the weather forecasts, Civil Defense messages and amateur radio message traffic is transmitted.

The operation of this network makes is possible for radio amateurs with radioteletype equipment in the area to receive printed copy of the weather reports and Civil Defense messages off the air. Such capability is of utmost importance in cases of emergency such as the hurricane Agnes flooding in 1972. Although the network is under the direction of Montgomery County Civil Defense all radio amateurs in the greater Philadelphia area are invited and urged to participate. Message traffic from all amateurs will be accepted. Further information may be obtained by calling Tom Gibson, Civil Defense Communications Officer, at 631 0561 Monday through Friday. Transmissions are FM, AFSK(F2) wide shift. Mark tone is 2125 Hz. Space tone is 2975 Hz.

The latter half of November and the first half of December have not produced much activity on the UHF/VHF bands. There have been some amall openings on six meters as is customary at this time of year. The Es season is just peaking up in the Southern Hemisphere and as always we get a little peak in Es at the Northern Hemisphere. There was a meteor shower which peaked up on the nite of December 13. This produced some bursts on six and two meters, particularly on six where stations from Alabama and around to the upper Midwest were heard here. Contacts had to be fast as the bursts were not long enough to handle anything except exchanges of reports, QTH's and names. I was heard on 2 meters by W9TYF in Chicago and by WøLER in Minneapolis. Both called me but I did not hear them as usual! The recent ice strom damaged some antenna systems and resulted in some frozen rotators, indication, high VSWR. I hope everyone gets there antenna problems straightened out by the contest time! I hope everyone gets the score they planned on in the contest!!! Good luck and sincere Holiday Greetikgs to all.



SIMPLE PIV DIODE TESTER Walt Bohlman, K3BPP

The ARRL Handbook shows a simple diode piv tester. (Page 551, 1969) The circuit requires an Adjustable H.V. source which is somewhat of a problem. Oscilloscopes usually have a by of 1000 V.D.C. at very low current. The following is a circuit that I use quite successfully.

Oscilloscope Circuit



The above circuit was built on a plexiglass sheet. To test - insert unknown diode into binding posts. Start at 0 voltage and gradually increase the voltage (2.5 meg. pot) until current starts to increase. This voltage is about 80 of usable P.I.V. of diode.

official bulletin NR 457 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS NEWINGTON, CT. DECEMBER 13, 1973 TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT: A new radio service for emergency medical use has been proposed by the Federal Communications Commission in Docket 19880. The Notice of Inquiry and Proposed Rulemaking relies heavily on a study by Advanced Technology Systems, Inc. and another by the Interdepartment Radio Advisory Committee, IRAC. In the IRAC report are recommendations for 38 frequencies ranging from 43 to 469 MHz, including the frequencies 449.85, 449.90 and 449.95 MHz presently allocated to the government radiolocation and amateur services on a shared basis. The documents convey a sense of urgency and, accordingly, usually close deadlines have been set for comment and reply comment, January 10 and 25, respectively. AR

OFFICIAL BULLETIN NR 458 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS NEWINGTON CT. DECEMBER 20, 1973 TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT: The ARRL Board of Directors meets twice annually to formulate the course of ARRL affairs. The first meeting of 1974 will take place January 17. The full members of the League elect the Board which has the overall responsibility for managing the affairs of ARRL. This democratic process is effective only to the extent that the membership participates. Now is the time for all members to communicate with their division directors. The director listing appears on page 8 of QST. AR

Between 8:30 A.M. and mid-afternoon on Christmas Day, members of Explorer Post 681 will be on Between 0:30 A.M. and mid-arteriation of the duty at their headquarters at 111 S. Easton Road.

Then, using more powerful transmitters, Explorers at the Glenside base will retransmit each. patient's message through a chain of amateur radio operators across the country. Finally, when an operator in the recipient city receives at message, he will make the final transmission by telephone. Peter Shavney, (WA30VH) Explorer Post advisor and chairman of the 20-member radio club, expects up to 10 boys tomorrow at the Easton Road clubhouse, located in his home. Three or four other Explorers will be at the Germantown Hospital.

The sdult radio operators working at the other three hospitals will have their messages relayed both through the Explorer base in Glenside and through a military frequency. Lee A. Cohen (K3MXM) of Elkins Park will send messages from Abington Memorial Hospital; Jerry Coumbs of Morton will work from Lankenau Hospital, and Robert Field of Melrose Park and Martin Shapiro of Rydal will transmit from Holy Redeemer.

Shavney said the Explorers were willing to give up Christmas Day with their own families to participate in the project. "They realize what a good morale thing this is going to be for the patients" he said. "We are able to send messages to any place in the world," said Shavney, "Last year, when we tried this for the first time, our furthest message went to Australia." They expect a minimum of 300 messages from the four hospitals, he said. (WA30VH and K3MXM are Pack-Rats -- Nice work fellows).




