The full text is in QST for November 1957, beginning on page 68.


A FEW FUNNIES

Perhaps you can get the Mayor or Civil Defense Director to start the generator or call the first CQ. If your location is more-or-less public, you could have a guide or two on duty to explain the set-up to visitors, both official and casual."

I know that the club is strictly V.H.F. and so far has never participated, as a club, in Field Day. Don't you think we should? Remember the floods in this section in 1955? Communications were established by the HAMS, some of them sitting in two feet of water in the basement of their homes up State. Other HAMS set up communications in row boats. During the explosion and fires in South Amboy, New Jersey, a few years ago, the only means of communication out of the town was HAM RADIO. I know that all of you remember the snow storm of March of this year. These things have all happened, and, God forbid, they can happen again. I feel that the club should participate in this most worthy venture.


(Please forgive my lenghty dissertation on emergency operation, but that is how I feel about it. It means so much to so many people. Helen)
