A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

This is the first opportunity I have had to greet the members of the Club and our many good friends operating on the V.H.F. bands.

I want to talk about the coming January V.H.F. Contest which brings the interest in V.H.F. to a fever pitch each year. Our Club has on occasion been accused of being a "Contest Club". This is far from the truth if one looks back on the meeting program record of our Club during the past few years. I feel the January Contest serves as the final proving ground for new equipment, antennas, techniques, and operating skill. Of course, one only has to participate to feel the thrill of competition and friendly sectional rivalry.

In the past, most of the members were one-band operators, primarily 2 meters, but last year the majority of the gang added 6 meters to their stations. This year we also have a number of club members on 220 and 420 mes. To do a good contest job, two-band or more operation is almost mandatory.

I know that many of the fellows are making plans for new rigs, antennas and converters. NOW is the time to put up that new stacked array not when the icicles are hanging off the whiskers; NOW is the time to get the bugs out of that speech equipment or to iron out those wrinkles in your switching system - not the night before the contest. Everything should be working "slick as a whistle" at contest time with many prior "dry runs" to prove out your gear.

I have appointed a Contest Committee consisting of W3KKN, W3HYJ and W3JSD, who are the "hot rods" on the V.H.F. bands and are formulating plans and ideas. They will issue timely bulletins between new and contest time.

Get in touch with them if you think you have a handy-dandy idea or kink - or if you need advice and belp;

Our club policy has been to do the job with an active membership - no associates or last minute contest membership drives for us. A good job can be done with the application of $\underline{\text{SKILL}}$ and $\underline{\text{GUTS}}$.

Come on, Fack Rats; let's give them a run for their money;

OFFICIAL BULLETTIN NR 672 FROM ARRL HDQS WEST HARTFORD, CONN. SEPT. 25, 1958

TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS. BT.

In order to give the Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service more leeway in use of radio remote control and audio frequency shift keying, FCC on Sept. 19 released proposed rulemaking to amend present regulations to permit radio remote control of amateur stations on frequency bands at 220 no and higher instead of 440 mc, and higher as now. Also proposed is addition of use of narrow band audio frequency shift keying to the entire six meter band. RACES regulations are similarly proposed for emendment to add, in the 50,35 to 50.75 Mc segment, type 6F2 emission. Deadline for comments on this proposal, docket 12607, is Movember 20.


