

OUR FIRST PICNIC (AUGUST 12, 1956)

Although the Club was only organized in May we decided to have a family picnic. At the regular meeting held on June 26, 1956 the President, W3FSC, Ozzie Jacoby announced that August 12 would be the date of the picnic. Each family was to bring their own food. Refreshments to be supplied by the Club for the members and their families.

W3ALR and W3FSC offered to investigate possible sites for holding the picnic.

Prior to August 1956 the meetings were held at the QTH of W3FSC and W3KKW. W3FSC announced he had obtained a meeting place for the Club, rent free. In August we held the meeting at the Chelten Hills Recreation Center, Lober and Upsal Streets in Mt. Airy.

At the June meeting held at the QTH of W3KKN, possible sites were discussed for holding the picnic. Mentioned were Mermaid Lake in Ambler and the Fort Washington State Park in Flourtown. The site to be decided by the picnic committee, consisting of W3LBH, W3SAO, Mother Rat and W3HYO and his XYL Violet.

We selected Fort Washington State Park recommended by W3LBH after hearing his report of this being the ideal place for a family picnic at no cost to the club.

Due to the fact we had the grand total of \$14.51 in the treasury we did some begging. At the QTH of W3HYO with the assistance of our XYLs we went thru all the Ham Publications and made up a list of possible prize donors. hundred letters were hand typed by Mother Rat and Violet.

We managed to have donated soda, toys and ladies gifts from various business houses in Philadelphia.

We planned on about 50 people attending the picnic. It was a beautiful day weather wise. (NOTE: we have never had to resort to the rain date in 14 years).

Twenty seven families were logged in at \$1.00 per family. Altogether we had close to 100 people, counting XYL's and children.

FROM THE BOOK RACK Paul R. Behrmann, K3WEU/AREA*

HOW TO FIX TRANSISTOR RADIOS AND PRINTED CIRCUITS by Leonard C. Lane (Tab Books No. 504)

256 Pages, over 150 Illustrations, 12 Big Chapters Price: \$7.95 Hardbound; \$4.95 Paperbound

Here is a completely updated, revised edition of the famous best-selling classic on transistor radio repair - a totally new. second edition of an all-time best seller. In addition to extensive enrichment and rearrangement of the first edition, the author brings FETs, zener diodes, FM radios - in fact, everything related to the current state of the art - into the picture. Here's the perfect reference and guide for electronic technicians who need to understand and repair semiconductor circuits efficiently. For beginners, this single volume provides the practical knowledge needed to fix any transistor radio.

For those interested in transistor physics, fundamentals are emphasized in the first two chapters. Chapter 2 explains how transistors are "put together", and introduces basic circuits. The real "meat" begins in Chapter 3 which thoroughly covers amplifier fundamentals, basic circuit configurations, biasing, FETs, JFETs, and IGFETs. The next two chapters are devoted to RF and IF amplifiers, detector and AGC circuits, plus more advanced audio circuits, including output stages. Chapter 6 concentrates on auto radios and Chapter 7 on FM radios. In describing each type of receiver, the author begins his description at the "front end" and "works" through to the output stages.

The next three chapters explain solid-state servicing, repair techniques, measurements, transistor testing, and alignment, while Chapter 11 covers the same categories in regard to printed circuits. Chapter 12 presents numerous troubleshooting charts designed to help locate and repair all common complaints in transistor radios.


TESTING A TUNED "L C" CIRCUIT

To find the resonant frequency without any current from the set going through it. Attach the signal generator with a one megohm resistor in series with the hot lead of the generator, on one side of the condenser to isolate the generator current from the circuit. Attach the ground lead to the other side of the condenser.

A scope may then be attached being sure to hook the hot lead of the probe on the side of the resistor nearest the condenser in order to "read" the pattern of the "LC" circuit and not the Signal Generator.

The Signal Generator then may be tuned to the different frequencies to determine the resonant frequency of the "LC" circuit.

The largest R.F. pattern will be the resonant frequency; and the narrow pattern on each side of it determines the "band pass" of the "LC" circuit.




