The amateur satellite is designed to transmit on 29.450 and 144.050 MHz. Amateurs interested in tracking the satellite should review the QST article series beginning in the July issue. The orbit of Australis Oscar 5 is expected to be essentially the same as the example used in the October QST tracking article. Special reporting forms are available without charge from Amsat.
