MALLARD HATCHES SIX EGGS WITH AID FROM PHILCO-FORD

From The evening Bulletin, By Joseph J. McMahon

A female mallard duck flew into the courtyard of the Philoo-Ford Corp, building in Willow Grove (Pa.) more than a month ago.

She built a nest in tall grass under a birch tree and laid six eggs. The eggs hatched a week ago.

The courtyard, about 125 feet square, is surrounded by the modern two-story buildings of the company's computer division at 3900 Welsh Road. Rows of windows look down into the courtyard.

WINDOWS LINED

During coffee breaks, the lunch hour, at odd moments during the day, the windows are lined with employes watching the new family's activities.

The only way into the courtyard is through glass doors in the building walls. These doors have been locked ever since the mother duck started laying eggs. The grass in the courtyard is uncut in the vicinity of the nest.

Water has been added to the courtyard pool.

TEACHER ASKS AID

These protective measures were taken by the company at the request of Jay C. Jacobson, a biology teacher at John Bartram High School.

Jacobson and three other Philadelphia biology teachers are on temporary assignment at the Philoo-Ford plant, where they are preparing a computerized Biology course for the Philadelphia sch@61 system.

Their office looks out on the courtyard. They were the first to observe the arrival of the mother mallard and, later, the eggs and then the baby ducks. Jacobson wrote a memo to company officials asking that the doors be locked, the grass uncut and water added to the pool while motherhood flourished in the courtyard.

You supply the water and we'll supply the food," he wrote. SUPPLIES FOOD

The company complied. Jacobson took up a collection and bought chick mash for the ducklings and a plastic bag full of goldfish for the mother duck. (Cont'd on page 3)

AIR FORCE CURVES SIGNALS PAST EARTH

The Air Force reported Saturday that its scientists have succeeded in sending strong signals from one artificial satellite directly to another, even when the two are on opposite sides of the earth.

The Air Force Systems Command said the direct radio communications between satellites proves a theory that the ionospheres, a high altitude, electrically charged layer of the atmosphere, can channel radio signals around a curve and over long distances, with little loss of energy.

MOBILE OPERATING TIPS

From LIMARC LOG, Feb. 1966

Did you ever stop to think that in addition to being concerned with the theft of your mobile rig, that it is your responsibility to be certain that an unauthorized person does not have access to it?

There are many times when others have your mobile in their possession such as loaning it to a friend or relative, leaving it in a parking lot or leaving it for repairs in a garage. It is usually not very convenient to pull the rig out each time someone other than yourself uses your car. It would be prudent to either have a locking device or some other way of disabling the transmitter portion such as removing a fuse or the power in some way. This writer recently had experience with an apparent bootlegger. This chacter overloaded my receiver on twenty as I passed an ocean front parking lot in Far Rockaway. About a mile down the road, I heard him give a familiar call, which belonged to a friend of mine, who is a licensed technician, this call had no place on twenty meters. I gave this pirate a shout, and darned if he didn't claim to be my friend and even used his QTH which is about five miles from his apparent location. Needless to say, he left the air after I challenged him. A phone call to my friend found him to be at school at the time of my QSO with the bootlegger. So fellows, be careful in whose care you leave your mobile and your rig.

VE2XPO AT EXPO-67

Planning to visit Expo-67? If so, ham station VE2XPO is located in the Youth Pavilion at La Ronde. The Telrex Tri-Band beam is visible from the Expo Express stop at La Ronde, and also at the termination of the guided tour train. Equipment presently on the air is a Swan 358, but just waiting to clear customs are: A Swan 500, a TR-4 with VFO, and SBLO1, an NC2OO. Also, a new Motorola VHF transceiver base station will soon be installed on the repeater (2M WBFM) frequencies. Other equipment will be installed at VE2XPO following the ARRL National Convention. VE2XPO is On 80-10 and 2M, WBFM and the station manager is Don Forbes, VE2DAZ. The station was made possible through the efforts of RAQI which is also the station sponsor. A QSL card display is planned-all visiting hams are being asked to leave a card to join the ranks of those so far collected. Also, anyone wishing to operate must show his license. And I may remind you that as Canada has no Novice class, reciprocal operating privileges are extended to Generals (or higher class) licensees. So, I am sure this would extend to VE2XPO operators.

The address for your Canadian operating privilege is: Department of Transport, Regional Director, Air Service, 25 St. Clair Ave., E., Toronto 7, Ontario, Canada.

P.E.P. INTAKE AND ALL THAT JAZZ!

Peak Envelope Power (P.E.P.) is a method for rating linear amplifier power capability. Amateur SSB transmitters are rated by the manufacturers in P.E. P. input for reason of F.C.C. requirements. Commercial SSB transmitters are normally rated in P.E.P. output as determined by the two tone test method. The methods used by manufacturers to arrive at P.E.P. input figures for amateur transmitters are seldom mentioned.

P.E.P. input is defined as the D.C. input at the modulation envelopes peak, and may be 1.4 to 2 or more times the P.E.P. output power. Factors contributing to the P.E.P. output figure are: Plate Efficiency Distortion, Plate Dissipation of tube type, loading and power supply capability. Distortion is the prime limiting factor. To measure precisely the P.E.P. input to a given amplifier at a given moment is a very difficult thing to accomplish. As a result, various methods of approximation have been devised. The assumed method used by manufacturers to establish amplifier capability is the two tone test, which measures the peak enverlope current without distortion, (flat topping) with unlimited driving power, times the plate voltage.

A method of P.E.P. input approximation and linear amplifier tune up procedure without a scope, which is fairly accurate, has been suggested in a past QST article by H. F. Wright, Dr. (WIPNE). It states, as an example, if your linear amplifier is rated at a plate voltage of 800 and a maximum signal current of 400 MA, (NOTE: Manufacturers ratings are for single steady signal, not speech) the procedure for tune up without a scope and P.E.P. approximation is as follows:

- 1. Insert a small amount of carrier from the exciter and tune the grid and plate circuits to resonance as indicated on an output indicator in the antenna feed line.
- 2. Adjust the coupling to the antenna feed line (usually a pi-net output loading capacitor) for maximum output for a given plate current at resonance, in this case 400 MA. If the D.C. current is less than 400 MA, the linear drive is insufficient or the antenna not matched as will be indicated by a SWR bridge.
- 3. Vary the amount of carrier insertion and observe output indicator, note the point at which increasing the carrier no longer results in rapid increase im dutput. This should be close to 400 MA. Use this figure to multiply by the plate voltage. This will result in the maximum signal linear power available of P.E.P. input. In this case, 320 watts.
- 4. Remove the carrier, adjust speech gain for a maximum speech peak of 200 MA on the Plate MA Meter. This will result in a speech P.E.P. input of 320 watts as above and allows for meter lag.
- 5. The above method should be used with caution, making readings rapidly and not extending time of heavy carrier insertion, dissipation of tubes. A scope should be used if available.

It is hoped that this will clear up some of the confusion on P.E.P. ratings and eliminate many misconceptions as to its meaning and applications. (From BARC Bulletin)
