NR 73 AUGUST 11, 1966

The United States has renewed a temporary agreement with the International Telecommunications Union in Geneva, Switzerland, permitting the handling of third party communications between amateur station 401ITU and amateurs in the U.S. until March of 1967. The messages must be relatively unimportant personal communications, involving no pecuniary interest. AR

NR 70 JULY 21, 1966 and NR 74 AUGUST 18, 1966

A reciprocal operating agreement is now effective between Germany, Kuwait and the United States. Amateurs of one country visiting or residing in the other may obtain permission to operate their own amateur stations there. The United States has previously reached reciprocal agreements with Australia, Belgium, Bolivia, Canada, Colombia, Costa Rica, the Dominican Republic, Ecuador, France, Germany, India, Isreal, Luxembourg, Paraguay, Peru, Portigual, Sierra Leone and the United Kingdom. Many others are being negotiated and successes will be announced as they occur. AR

NR 75 AUGUST 25, 1966

The Federal Communications Commission this week denied a petition, RM 519, filed some time ago by WA2VAF. The amateur had asked that the maximum permissible input power for U.S. amateur transmitters be reduced by steps over a period of years, finally to reach 125 watts. The Commission did not feel that a power reduction of this order would reduce mutual interference between amateurs significantly. AR

PACK RAT in the news

TWO GUYS NAMED JOE REUNITED VIA HAM RADIO (From the Evening Bulletin) By Ephriam Gorenstein of the Bulletin Staff

A guy named Joe who spent 20 years looking for another guy named Joe found him recently in the Northeast Detective Division, thanks to the help of a Mayfair ham radio operator.

The Joe who was looking was Joseph Mandela, 41, a Paterson, N.J. fireman. The Joe who was found was Detective Joseph Tamaselli, 40, and the ham operator was Edward Guscin, K3IFH, of 7121 Glenloch St.

The search that Guscin helped to end successfully began in 1946 when Mendala, back from Marine Corps service in the South Pacific, began to think of his good friend from boot training days, Joseph Tomaselli.

TRAINED TOGETHER

The two men had trained together at Cherry Point, N.C., and had been close companions until both were sent to different areas of the South Pacific in 1944.

But when Mandela decided to try and renew the acquaintance he ran into ${\bf a}$ problem.

He couldn't remember his friend's last name exactly and he had lost the book containing Tomaselli's name and address.

Through the years, Mendela contacted various mutual friends trying to find his buddy, "Joe," but no one could provide a clue to the lost friend's whereabouts.

Then a few weeks ago Mendela was operating his ham radio—a hobby he had taken up in 1957—when he happened to hear another operator signing off from "May-fair, Pa."

'MAYFAIR' RANG A BELL

The name "Mayfair" rang a bell. Mendela remembered coming to Philadelphia on a five-day leave once with his friend "Joe."

Joe's family had only a small apartment in Frankford so Mendela stayed with his Friend's aunt and uncle in Mayfair.

Thinking back on his brief stay in Philadelphia, Mendela remembered that the uncle's name was William Brown,

Mandela then began trying to contact the operator in "Mayfair."

After many unsuccessful attempts, he finally hooked up with Guscin who promised to try and help Mendela find a "Joe." (next page)

This was the beginning of the end of the search.

GUSCIN LOCATED BROWN

Guscin quickly learned that William Brown, of 4514 Teesdale St. was the man who had entertained a Marine sergeant named Joseph Mendela in 1944. Through Brown, Guscin got in touch with Tomaselli and arrangements were made for the two "Joes" to talk together over a radio-phone hookup.

Witnesses to that conversation describe it as a "real emotional reunion."

"They both were tonguetied at first and then they started talking fast and furiously trying to make up for 20 years of lost time," one bystander said.

Tomaselli, who had also made several efforts to contact Mendela, will be reunited with his old friend sometime this month.

Tomaselli promised Mendela that as soon as he gets his vacation he and his wife, Anne, will go to Paterson for a reunion with Mendela, his wife and their two sons.

The Tomaselli's have a son, Joseph M., 16.

HELPING HAMS SEND SAILOR NATIVE NEWS

The distraught sailor frantically knocked at his neighbor's front door. It was 2 a.m. but a news story on television had aroused the sailor's concern for his parent's welfare. The young man turned to his "ham" neighbor for help.

TOPEKA TORNADO

Sailor Bob Klein, who is stationed at the Naval Communications Center, Trenton, N.J., was watching the late news on TV and recognized a scene near his home in Topeka, Kan. A tornado had slashed through his hometown and Bob shuddered when he saw a picture of the devastation which was only a block or two from home.

PROMISED ACTION .

"Flash" Gordon, W3IUR, answered the furtive inquiry by assuring the seaman that he would do everything possible to make a radio contact in the Topeka area to try and get information about Mr. & Mrs. Klein. Later the same morning "Flash" came into Johnsville's K3NAL and began his contacts with fellow hams. By noon things began to pop.

THE HAM RELAY

Aham in New Hampshire became one of the crucial relay men along with an assist from a Georgia ham. The latter ham had alented K3NAL to read Topeka, but when "Flash" could not pick up Topeka the New Hampshire man made the contact.

THE NEWS

KIKYY, call letters for the New Hampshire ham, contacted ham WMGTU in Topeka and relayed the sailor's request for information. The Topeka ham operator personally walked over to the sailor's home and then relayed the news about the parents to New Hampshire. New Hampshire in turn relayed the information to Johnsville.

PARENTS SAFE

By the end of lunch time "Flash" and his K3NAL partners called Sailor Klein and told him that his parents were safe and uninjured although the home had been damaged by the storm. Bob thanked his ham friends for their efforts and contacts.

WELL DONE

Smiling through their perspiration, the local hams stepped our of their control room (It's rumored that one operator stripped down for his work as far as possible). After the incident, the Johnsville hams shared an inner sense of satisfaction by knowing that they had helped someone in time of need.

HAMS ASSIST IN FIRST FIGHT BROADCAST

The record books are full of accounts of the Jack Dempsey—Georges Carpentier fight back in 1921 but it seems almost forgotten that this was the first fight broadcast by radio and that this "first" in broadcasting was successful largely because of the part played in it by the radio amateurs.

Sack Dempsey had become overnight, a sensation on that memorable, hot, Fourth of July in Toledo when he knocked out the gigantic Jess Willard in the fourth round. For his first championship fight he was matched with Frenchman Georges Carpentier who actually had been fighting as a light-heavyweight but was debonaire and handsome and the idol of France and figured to be a good attraction.

Interest in the forthcoming fight was so high it was decided to broadcast it by radio. A transmitter patterned somewhat after Frank Conrad's station 8XK in East Pittsburgh was built and an antenna was erected near the fight location in Jersey City. But who would be able to receive the broadcast? In 1921 there was no radio telephony to speak of. 8XK and the Western Marine Stations KQD and KQG were about all that could be heard in the area.

Virtually the only ones that could be expected to pick up the broadcast would be radio amateurs. This small group of potential listners was not enough to make the project worth while but someone came up with the "Big Idea." This would not only be the world's first fight broadcast but would also be the world's first "closed circuit broadcast." With the aid of the American Red Cross, theatres throughout the area were induced to provide their facilities for the night of the broadcast and prominant hams were solicited to furnish equipment that would receive and amplify the broadcast for the theatre audiences. The proceeds would go to the Red Cross. These theatre broadcasts were advertised in advance but there was much speculation as to whether people would actually pay money to hear a description of a fight.

All of which leads up to our story.

Down in South Jersey we had formed "The Bridgeton Radio Association"——Kids with spark coils and buzzers (there was even one YL.) One day we saw bill—boards all over town reading:

"World's Championship Fight—Jack Dempsey vs. Georges Carpentier—Hear it Live by Radio at the Criterion Theatre.

July 2, 1921 Admission 50g and \$1.00.

Well! Here we really had something coming to town. Certainly there were no facilities in Bridgeton for handling something like that. It was the subject of our nightly round tables (nets) and meetings and we could hardly wait to see the equipment "they" must have. It turned out that arrangements had been wade to have the installation made and operated by Marcus Frye, 3NG, of nearby Vineland who had become quite famous with his lKW spark transmitter.

On July first, 3AVS, our club president had a frantic cll from Leo Bitzer, the manager of the Criterion, asking for help. 3NB, for some reason we never determined, "bugged out" and Bitzer was left high and dry with tickets sold for the event and no way to handle the broadcast.

3AVS quickly rounded up all the club members that were available and we, in our youthful enthusiasm, decided to do it ourselves. This really took some doing. We strung up a wire from another building to the water tower of the theatre and then down to the stage. This was not an antenna with a transmission line—this was just a length of wire.

The manager set up a long table in the center of the stage and we all brought to the theatre whatever receiving equipment we had that would hold together and put it on the table. Such a sorry assortment you can hardly imagine. There were coils of wire wound around oatmeal boxes, crystal detectors, a few Audiotrons, home made grid-leaks bigger than the tubes, all mounted bread board fashion. No one had a loud speaker. We all used headphones.

we would have to use our ingenuity. 3KL, the Mayor's son, was not a club member but he had an impressive looking set. It wasn't working but it sure was impressive. It was all rack and panel construction and was made for him by 3AAN in Millville. We borrowed it.

To do the actual receiving we had to use one of the breadboard rigs. We decided to use 3AGF's because it had a stage of audio amplification.

Discarding the rest of the equipment and arranging 3KL's for show and the breadboard rig for use, we set up five chairs with headphones, pencils and pads for each of the operators on one side of the table so that we would be facing the audience. Signals from NAI and NSD were louder than any of us had ever gotten them at home and signals from the ships in Delaware Bay clearing traffic with WCY were terrific. We might just get by.

Of course, we had one slight groblem -- with only headphone, the audience wouldn't be able to hear anything. We must have a loud speaker.

The local music store had a horn mounted above the door so music could be played and heard outside the store. We borrowed it. This turned out to be a Western Electric two stage Vacuum tube amplifier with Baldwin Speaker. There was even a microphone that came with it. We were in business.

With the amplifier and speaker connected we could now shake the theatre with the roars of the rotary gaps spitting out the dots and dashes. Wonder how the broadcast would be. What if when the time came we couldn't receive it: It was too late to back out now.

An hour before fight time we were at our positions and JAGF was scouring the wavelengths trying to find the station. This was a special transmitting station erected just for the fight and we didn't even know the wavelength. We couldn't find it. Just before curtain time we moved to the opposite side of the table and as the curtain went up and the stage lights went on the audience saw the backs of five very unhappy kids: 3ABM, 3AFZ, 3AGF, 3AVS and 37L. We just couldn't face those people out there.

We had to do something so the mike was connected and 3AGF read from a previously prepared paper describing the situation that had put us in this spot. while doing a little ad-libbing and tuning in a few spark stations to show that the radio was working, lo and behold—there it was—the announcer's voice.

Reception was very poor. Signals were weak and almost drowned out by static. It was useless to send it out over the speaker.

At least we had something to work on now. It was just about time for the fight to start. With a quick whispered consultation we set up our strategy. Each "operator" would write down on his pad what words he thought he heard through the static and feed this information (?) to 3AGF who would try to make something out of it and give a blow-by-blow description over the microphone. We managed to get enough to know which round we were in all the time and with BAGF describing the blows the audience reaction became very encourage ing and the fight coming out of the speaker was probably better than the real thing. the first program of said of

The only clearing of the static came in the fourth round when we heard very Clearly that Dempsey had knocked out Carpentier. This announcement over the speaker brought a roar from the audience.

The house lights were turned on for the first time we dared to face the audience. The theatre was packed and we got a standing ovation. People came up to the stage to shake our hands. It was amazing. History had been

Some time later we received a letter from President Harding thanking us for the part we played in raising money for the Red Cross. We also received from the Red Cross a beautiful scroll commemorating the event.


