ARRL BULLETINS

NR. 987, JANUARY 7, 1965

The Department of Transport has changed the rules for Anadian amateurs to per-To mit only c.w. in the lower 100 kc. of the six and two meter bands. The changes, effective immediately, are intended to protect stations involved in weak signal work, such as moonbounce auroral reflection, and the like, and particularly in connection with the Oscar III repeater which is scheduled to operate in the two meter band after launch sometime this year.

NR. 990. JANUARY 28, 1965

The U.S. Supreme Court has refused to review the Federal Court of Appeals decision that the present FCC license fees are legal. ARRL was one of several groups who had asked for the review. The only remaining means of overturning FCC fees is through Con-fressional action. Texas Representative Rogers will seek passage of a bill forbidding FCC to charge fees without the express authority of the Congress. Hearings were held on a similar bill last year but the bill did not reach the floor. See September 1964 QST and the forthcoming March 1965 issue for complete details.

NR. 991, FEBRUARY 4, 1965

FCC has adopted the Conditional Class rules it proposed in Docket 15640. shown in full on page 56 of November QST. After April 15, applicants for Conditional Class under the distance rules must live more than 175 miles. from an FCC office, quarterly or semiannual examination point. There is no change in eligibility by reason of physical disability, military service, or overseas residence. Present holders of the Conditional Class license are not affected in any way. HELP FOR THE LAFAYETTE HE 45

The original HE 45 left much to be desired in the transmitter end. Numerous articles have been written on stabilizing and increasing the audio. The receiver section just needs a careful alignment as the original instructions call for and placement of some temporary compensating capacitors to cut down on receiver drift. Recently, I put a vertical on the car and wanted maximum output of the transmitter. This meant that the tuning procedure should be corried out with the unit set in the position it would have in the mobile. The critical controls for output are the plate-tune capacitor and the loading capacitor. The other controls can be touched up in the shack to a dummy load. Unfortunately, the final controls can only be reached through two holes on

the side of the chassis, naturally the side that you can't get to. The later model HE 45's have the final controls so they can be reached from the front, so I removed 3 crystal sockets (of which there were 6), removed the bracket holding the final tank assembly and remounted this bracket so I could tune the final from the front through the holes left by the removal of the xtyl sockets. This not only allowed the tuning to be done with the rig in the operating position, but apparently this new position is a better one for parts than the original. Output and audio are much improved so look for me mobile.

The FCC gave Pan American Airways a 90 day permit to have two of their Jets communicate with ground stations via a satellite relay. The aviation incortry is interested in this kind of communication for long over water flights. On Jan. 28th, a Jet flying from Hong Kong to Tokyo sent a message via satellite to a ground station 7000 miles away.

The message was transmitted over the Formosa Strait, passed through Syncom 3, which is in stationary orbit over the Gilbert Islands. It traveled 20,000 miles from plane to the satellite, then another 20,000 miles to Camp Roberts, California. The plane used 148.260 mc.

SENDING: AN SOS FOR SOCIETY OF SOLID "SQUARES"

As inserted into the CONGRESSICNAL RECORD by Representative Schadeberg of Wisconsin, the WASHINGTON STAR recently published remarks on "The Return of the Square" excerpted from a speech by Charles H. Brower, President of the advertising firm of Batten, Barton, Durstine & Gaborne, as follows:

Back in Mark Twain's day, or a of the finest words in our language was "square". You gave a man a square deal if you were honest. And you gave him a square meal when he was hungry. You stood foursquare for the right, as you saw it, and square against everyth: else. When you got out of debt, you were square with the world. And that we when you could look your fellow man square in the eye.

Then a lot of strange characters got hold of the honest, wholesome word, bent it all our of shape and gave it back to our children. Convicts gave it the first twist. To them a square was an inmate who would not conform to the convict code. From the primins it was flashed across the country on the morijuna circuit of the bopsters and hipsters. Now everyone knows what a square is. He is the man who never learned to get away with wrongdoing. A Joe who volunteers when he doesn't have to. A guy who gets his kicks from trying to some thing better than anyone else can. A book who gets so lost in his work that he has to be reminded to go home. A fellow who laughs with his belly instead of his upper lip. A slob who still gets choked up when the hand plays "America the Beautiful."

His tribe isn't thriving too well in the current climate. He doesn't fit too neatly into the current group of angle players, corner cutters, sharpshooters and goof-offs. He doesn't believe in opening all the packages before Christmas. He doesn't want to fly now and pay later. He's burdened down with old-fashioned ideas of honesty, loyalty, courage and thrift. Being properly licensed to operate a "ham" station, having a clean signal and remaining within the confines of prescribed frequency boundries as set forth by F.C.C., is not always sufficient to make you completely "legal" with recard to Federal Laws.

The improper use of call signs by even the most "seasomed" operators is start. ling, to say the least. Although citations are less frequently given on the VHF and UHF bands, (due to limited propagation and lack of 0.0.'s) improper call sign usage is the mark of a "sloppy" operator.

Phenetics are legal...only if used correctly. They are unnecessary for the most part and should be used only in instances where readability is a problem. The prescribed manner is toggive the othere station's call sign first and your call sign last. e.g. K7AAD, this is W8HHS calling...or, K7AAD, this is

W8HHS standing by. Under difficult conditions it is acceptable to say, "W8HHS, this is K7-Able...Able...Dog, K7AAD calling and standing by." It is not only feelish to phonetically spell out the other fellow's call letters...it is unnecessary. After all, he knows what HIS call sign is! Yet, station afterth, station uses phonetics (sometimes rather juvenils at that) when giving the other fellows call as well as their own. If phonetics must be used, your call sign must be given as K7AAD just prior to standing by. Your call sign must be the last used fellowing any transmission. It is ILLEGAL to put your call sign first and the other station's last, e.g.—"this is W8HHS calling K7AAD and standing by." Yet, you hear this being done time and time.again on the bands. An A-l operator would not be guilty of this practice.

Another highly illegal but frequently practiced "boo-boo" is carried out by the "nuttive pie" operator. He men be heard to say (using his call sign), as he stands by, "W8HHS this is K7A-A and a D." He might be heard saying this, "W8HHS, here is K7 "Awfully-Awfully-Delightful", or some such childish thing. It is ILLEGAL as well as being characteristic of "lidism". There seem to be guys who lie awake nights thinking up silly phonetics for the call signs of fellow hams. This sort of thing is O.K. for the club "smoker" or ham picnic maybe, but has no place on the air.

The other fellow's call MUST be used in its entirety too. I've had a number of fellows who know my call sign as well as their own, who insist on coming back to me with, "8HHS (or W8HS), this is K7AAD". (Loren's and my call signs used only as examples in this text).

In qualifying for a ham license, knowledge of proper call sign procedures must be proven. Why then do these violations continue? Amateur radio is a serious pastime. The same skill and effort used in propagating a DX signal should be exercised in maintaining good operating habits. Fun and games have no place on the air if you consider yourself a serious amateur operator.

Smut and vulgarity have their place too...but not on the air. I was in a net for a year once (in another call area) and one of the net members had a call sign ending in "IPV". He insisted on saying, "this is W-I-Pee*Vigorously". In reality he was the only net member who was amused by this. I have heard suggestive phonetics much worse than this too...and used on the air!

A little serious effort to clean up our operating habits will keep all of us legal, create better world—wide images of the American amateur and give us the satisfaction of knowing we are not "lids".

TWO METER ACTIVITY

It seems that the usual situation prevails after every contest. The bulk of group crawls off into wherever they came from to populate the band during the sign battle. Things have not been exactly jumping, although there is a real rare one to report. One of our brethern, known to all hands, has been heard on two meters, SSB no less. Not only that, but he has been heard in two different spots in the band at the same time! This is a feat that can only be accomplished with the better and more expensive rigs.

A bit of snooping has shown nightly QW operation by a number of people, notably W2AZU, known to all for his converter fame. I have heard one eight district station coming through \$5 during a sked and several calling a fifth district station and it appeared that a contact was made although this is unconfirmed since some info is often to appoint in the hope that bits will be copied.

Maybe this would be a good time to once again remind all hands that by gentlemen's agreement, the lower 100 kc of two is reserved for CW and the fone boys should not operate in this portion. To my knowledge, the Pack Rats for the pert, have always honored this agreement, and there is no reason to feel that this will change. There is, however, en Oscar shot coming up, and some of this operation will be attemped on cw. It is important that during the course of waiting for a pass of a satelite, or after one has gone by, the lower end of the band is not hogged—up with whit—chat. A serious DX attempt may be jammed in so doing.



A STABLE OSCILLATOR FOR VHF-UHF



Grid Circuit of 128Y7A amplifier

At six meters the generation of a frequency with adequate stability for single sideband is not very difficult. However, as you go higher up in frequency you find that generating a SSB signal that has the stability you are accustomed to on the lower frequencies can become quite a problem.

I read many articles on stable oscillators and did a lot of experimenting to find something that would give me the stability I wanted at 432 Mc. I found that the transistorized Hartley oscillator did by far the best job. In my experimentation it appeared that the variation in frequency was primarily a function of the crystal temperature in the Hartley circuit. Therefore I experimented with various methods of maintaining the crystal at a constant temperature.

Stability can be increased by putting the crystal in an oven of 0.1 degree.
Centigrade stability or better, but ovens like this are hard to come by and very difficult to build. The standard crystal oven (the clicker type) is not satisfactory. While it maintains the average frequency well, the crystal oscillator will vary its frequency significantly during the heating and cooling cycle of the oven. In other wor ds, the short-term stability is not acceptable

In order to isolate the crystal from temperature changes, it was put into one of the clicker ovens but the oven was not operated. The oven acts only as a thermal barrier, keeping any quick temperature changes from getting to the crystal.

The stability of the oscillator circuit shown is about 1 part in 10 million explus or minus 4 cps at 40 Mc. over a fairly long period of time. Stability is plus or minus 0.4 cps at 40 Mc. over periods of 5 to 10 minutes if the room temperature is fairly stable.

I am presently using this circuit to multiply to 362 Mc. which I use to mix with 50 Mc. SSB to get on 432 Mc. SSB. The drift at 432 is completely negligible. I have QSOs for over an hour with people who have not had to retouch their receiver tuning after the initial call.

CIRCUIT DESCRIPTION:

The oscillator is a Hartley type. The crystal operates in its series mode. It is connected between the transistor's emmitter and a tap about one turn up from the bottom of the collector coil. At frequencies below 35 Mc., a 1 or 2 turn link may be used. The tap or link should be adjusted to provide just enough feedback to make the circuit oscillate.

Be sure to use as high a C to L ratio in the collector circuit as possible. When you "grid-dip" the collector coil, remove the 560 chm resistor and apply DC to the circuit because the collector capacity of the transistor (internal) will vary with collector corrent and change the tuning of the circuit.

The buffer's output is matched to the next stage by means of a variable capacitor. Maximum output is 40 milliwatts into a 50-ohm resistive load. In my system the buffer drives a 128Y7A amplifier which furnishes more than three times the drive I need to operate a 5763 tripler.

Well, that's it. The oscillator has a multitude of uses in transmitters and converters. I hope you will find the circuit as useful as I have.


