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THE TRIP TO ARRL HEADQUARTERS, NEWINGTON, CONN.

Before leaving, the driver introduced himself and said that smoking would be permitted after we left Philadelphia and cocktails would be served en-route. The only liquid received on board was the condensation from the air conditioner which gathered on the floor, Hi!

At 7:15 A.M. we made our first stop in New Jersey, where everyone had coffee and some ate breakfast. The last three out were K3DLS, Carl, K3EOD Al and $\upsigma3UMI$, \upsigmainsimposition

Our second stop was at 9:30 A.M. in Connecticutt. Most just got out and gave their legs a stretch. It was here that we asked Jack Weldon, a friend of "Grandpop Bill", if he still wanted to be a ham. On hand to greet us were; WIHDQ, Ed Tilton, VHF Editor, QST; WIECH, Gary Foskett, Assistant Secretary ARRL; John, a W3/1, "Strays" writer, QST, (Sorry we didn't get his complete handle and call); WIYMM, Ellen White, Assistant Communications Manager; WIWPD, Bob White, DXCC, QST. We were divided into groups of seven and given a tour of the place.

Don't expect a glowing description, for, because of the carpenters strike, the building was not ready for any group to visit. If you have ever visited anyone who has just moved, you can understand. Everything is in the room it should be, but everything must be sorted out and put in place. That was the confusion we met. Workmen were still working on the driveway and grounds and inside, they were busy setting things aright.

While the groups were taking the tour, Grandpop Bill and some others set up the model, which will be on permanent display in the lobby. Also a phone call was put-in to the old Headquarters in West Hartford, by Nooana Crossley, to let them know we were there. Pictures were taken of the Model Presentation along with the Presentation of the check for \$500.00 from the club and its friends.

The only ARRL Official present who had any idea of what the model looked like was W3YA, Gil Crossley, Director, Atlantic Division. Those at Headquarters were expecting either a wooden model or a cardboard model. Comments heard were, "I can't believe it, I can't believe it!" The model is an exact duplication of the new building and the W1AW Shack, from the blue-prints. It is a perfect reproduction including the landscaping and antennas for W1AW and is 51×91 . Only four calls out of over 700, that's not a bad score. Think of the troubles they must have making up the Callbook, wow!



The name "Choose Bits" is my brainchild. Rats eat cheese and leave little bits, so we try to pass along little bits of information


That is the story of the two names! "Pack Rats" and "Cheose Bits".



NOTES:

- 1. Sub-bands of 117-160 MC. range are: SW1 : 118-133 MC. (aircraft band)
 - SW2: 130-147 MC. (aircraft and 2 meters)
 - SW3 : 143-167 MC. (2 meters and "police band")
- Transmissions above 2 meter ("police bands") are mainly NBFM and are not normally received satisfactorily.
- 3. Best results were obtained with aircraft and 2 meter bands using wire antenna of approximately 2 ft. length, or with narmal 2 meter antenna. 220 MC. circuit was found to work effectively only with normal 220 MC. antenna. 6 meter circuit was found to be least satisfactory because of more critical antenna, ground and unknown other reasons.
- 4. Fairly effective FM band (88-108 MC.) reception in strong signal area was found to be obtained with 223 MC. oscillator ("CQ", July 1961, p. 51) loosely coupled (spaced approx. 2 inches apart) to L2 of 117-160 MC. circuit, with 118-133 MC. sub-band position ("fremodyne" circuit).
- 5. Basic circuits are modifications of Stoner's articles in May 1962, p. 77 and Oct. 1962, p. 61 of "CQ".
- 6. Lafayette 4-transistor amplifier (#PK-453, \$4.95) is recommended for audio amplifier uses 8-10 ohm speaker, and 50K volume control. Separate battery for audio amplifier was found to give best results, to avoid motor-boating when battery gets a little weak; however a decoupling circuit could probably be employed to avoid this.
- 7. Two or more of these Super-Regen circuits can easily be mounted in a 3"x4"x5" or other convient minibox, employing a switch such as Lafayette SW-30 (4 pole, 3 post min. rotory) for switching to single audio system, battery and T1. Author's arrangement is one 117-160 MC. (3 sub-bands), one 223 MC. Oscilator for FM band, plus audio system in 3"x4"x5" Grey Hammertone minibox. (see fig. 3) with switch position and connector for outboard 220 MC. and 3 meter circuits (still using same batteries audio system and T1 as for other circuits.
- 8. Super-Regen circuits must be mounted on insulated boards such as plexiglas or fibreglas, however a larger sized minibox for mounting is desireable to obtain sizeable ground for the antenna.

SMALL OSCILLATOR POWERED BY ARATH

VALUEY FORGE, Pa.--A small 500Kc oscillator was powered by a rat through implanted electrodes in bicelectrogenoses experiments at the Missle & Space division of General Electric Co.,

In the experiment, designed to show that useable power could be generated by living animals, a maximum power of 155 microwatts was observed under a load of 500 ohms at 0,23 volts, acof the physical biology operation at the divisions space sciences labora-

Mr. Konikoff noted that while much research remains to be done, the experiment indicates that the electricity in animal bodies can be used for other than diagnostic purposes, such as electrocardiograms.

He suggested the possibility of cardiac stimulating devices in which the power is generated by the human's body rather than by implanted batteries Another possibility, he said, was improved sensors.

In the rat experiment, two electrodes were implanted, one of stainless steel insorted subcutaneously and the other of platinum back in the poritoneal cavity.

The oscillator used in the experiment was put togother by the group's electronics people, Mr. Konikoff said. While it used standard components. the GE researcher pointed out that advances in the field of bioelectrogenesis will depend a great deal on use of micro circuits which can take advantage of the low power generation of animals.

Current efforts, he said, are directed toward determining the useful length of time clectrodes can be implanted without causing harm to the animals. various electrode materials, locations for implantation and ways of achieving maximum enorgy lovels, among other, he said.

The custom made labels that I have evolved fill the bill nicely at this ham shack. The labels worked out so well for me, I thought I would pass the idea along.

Now for the details;

- (1) Take a length of ½" wide Scatch #33 Electrical Tape and press it firmly down on a suitable surface (ei, clean glass or metal surface.
- (2) Now take a length of ½" wide Scotch Magic Tape and press it firmly down of top of the Scotch %33 (stop one). Now rut surface hard with cloth or finger to remove any air bubbles.
- (3) Take a piece of cloth and moisten it with Carter's white ink. Rub moistened cloth over surface of the Scotch Magic Tape, let the ink set for a few seconds, then wipe clean. (this leaves an invisible film of ink on the surface of the magic tape).
- (4) Now print your labels in white ink on the prepared tape.
- (5) You now have two choices as to the finish of the label. Use a strip of Scotch Magic Tape over the propared label for a flat finish or a strip of clear Scotch Tape for a glossy finish.
 - (6) Lift the label off surface with a knife or razer blade, round off corners with scissors and apply it to your project.

World War I proved that the American Radio Amateur had made his place in the world, for without him the U.S. Naval Service would have been in a hell of a mess. I know for I was Chief Radio aboard a destroyer based overseas, and had ten operators in my charge, three of them were dyed in the wool hams, before entering the service. Everyone who was there at the time ' knows that all available parts were taken off all ships, and there were numerous times at sea when Radio Equipment failed, and emergency repairs had to be made in a hurry, and the only men capable of makeing these repairs were, you guessed it, my three Hams, God Blass 'em. Many lives were probably the steering column into an almost saved because of the ability of these men to function under undue stress. The others were excellent operators but were lost when it came to complicated repairs.

NAVY EXHIBIT AT 17th ANNUAL AFCEA NATIONAL CONVENTION

The U.S. Navy's exhibit for the 17th AFCEA (Armod Forces Communications and Electronics Association) was an operational amateur radio station. The Navy's Washington, D.C. voice into the amateur radio world, K4NAM, operated fixed portable from the lobby of the Shoraton-Park Hotel. Operations were conducted for approximately eighteen

hours each day of the convention. Volunteer licensed operators from the Army, Navy Air Force and Marine Corps were on hand to assist the delegates and to keep the circuits alive. Most of the over 5000 delegates who registered for the convention visited the booth, and a full time photographer was on hand to document the presence of association officials and high ranking military and civilian visitors.

The "HAM" station itself had four operating positions for voice. CW and RTTY operations. Contacts were established on all brads 2,6,10, 20,40 and 80 meters. Five antennas were located on the hotel roof. An all band vertical, a triband beam, a 6 and 2 meter beam, a 40 moter doublet and a long wire listening antenna were available for any of the positions.

Amateur operations were enhanced by relatively good circuit conditions which existed throughout the convention. There were 382 contacts established and the DX stations included amoteurs in Conada; Germany, Honduras, Available from electronic parts distrib-Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, Greenland, Equador, Venezuela, Austria, Canal Zono, El Salvador, Peru, Bolivia, Mexicao, Nigoria, Cuba, Costa Rica, England, Okinawa, Japan and Algeria. The Inter-Continental Amateur Network (ICAN) was handled each morning from the exhibit booth.

> The location of the station and the continuous availability of amateur operators mode the station the focal point for the convention delegates.

The U.S. Navy is proud of its long association with AFCEA and the Amateur Radio Fraternity. The exhibit offered tangible evidence that the U.S. Novy is still active in its encouragement and support of these outstanding organizations.
